COURSE DESCRIPTIONS AND JUSTIFICATIONS

FASHION DESIGN AND MERCHANDISING

169 EVENING GOWN CONSTRUCTION (2.00) (day or evening)

Justification: This course was successfully offered as an experimental course in the summer of 2019 term. FASH 169 – Evening Gown Construction is an advanced course which supports the curriculum in the Fashion Design and Merchandising Program. The content covered in this course compliments the current course offerings of the program and it is part of the selective requirements of various degrees and certificates.

Prerequisite: None.

Recommended Preparation: Eligibility for READ 836 and ENGL 836; or ENGL 847 or ESL 400; Eligibility for MATH 110; Basic sewing skills.

Description: Students learn advanced sewing techniques used in the construction of evening gowns. They create gowns incorporating the techniques learned in class, including working with difficult fabrics and bias.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; Certificate of Achievement; CSU transferable.

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS AND JUSTIFICATIONS

ART

131 ART HISTORY GOES TO THE MOVIES (3.00) (day or evening)

Justification: This course was successfully offered as an experimental course: ART 685 CA, CB, CC and CD; Art Goes to the Movies Part I, II, III and IV. Recent works of cinema based on artists and their process enable a unique opportunity to engage with art history. This course fills a need to enhance the scope of offerings and speak to contemporary students in ways that address diverse learning styles. ART 131 is a selective requirement of the Art History AA Degree program.

Prerequisite: None.

Recommended Preparation: Eligibility for ENGL 100.

Description: A cultural and historical survey of great masters of art history, and how their creative process is depicted in film. This course includes the unique political, social, economic, and religious environment of artists in their age, and how this shaped the forms and ideas of their art. The depiction of the historic setting, demonstrations of the artists at work, and re-creation of the artistic milieu of the time through film illustrates the process of artistic production and creativity.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; AA-T/AS-T Degree for Transfer; CSU, UC transferable.

MULTIMEDIA ART AND TECHNOLOGY

424 3D ANIMATION FUNDAMENTALS (3.00) (day or evening)

Justification: This course is the first of two courses that cover the concepts and techniques of 3D computer animation in more depth than the current course, MART 430. Expanding the material covered

in MART 430 to two semesters allows students to gain a deeper understanding of the underlying principles involved in creating quality animation and better prepares them for the job market. Curriculum and course content is being developed with the advice and consultation of professional animators on our advisory board from game and feature film studios. This course is required for the 3D Animation and Video Game Art certificate and AA degree.

Prerequisite: None.

Recommended Preparation: Familiarity with 3D animation tools.

Description: Fundamental principles of performance animation in 3D animation software. Students will develop skills in conveying weight, understanding timing, the use of arcs in movement, and bringing anthropomorphic characters to life.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; Certificate of Achievement; CSU transferable.

425 3D ADVANCED 3D ANIMATION (3.00) (day or evening)

Justification: This course is the second of two courses that cover the concepts and techniques of 3D computer animation in more depth than the current course, MART 430. Expanding the material covered in MART 430 to two semesters allows students to gain a deeper understanding of the underlying principles involved in creating quality animation and better prepares them for the job market. Curriculum and course content is being developed with the advice and consultation of professional animators on our advisory board from game and feature film studios. Course is a requirement for the 3D Animation and Video Game Art certificate and AA degree.

Prerequisite: None.

Recommended Preparation: Completion of MART 424 is strongly recommended, or approval of instructor via demo reel review.

Description: Continuation of concepts and techniques covered in MART 424. The principles of animation are covered in depth as they apply to the 3D environment: bipedal locomotion (walks, runs, gait changes), weight, balance, and character performance.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; Certificate of Achievement; CSU transferable.

680CL 3D ADVANCED 3D ANIMATION (3.00) (day or evening)

Justification: This course offering is an experimental version of proposed course MART 425 - Advanced 3D Animation. This course provides students an opportunity to further refine their animation skills in order to better prepare for the job market.

Prerequisite: None.

Recommended Preparation: MART 430, completion of MART 430 strongly recommended. or Approval of instructor via demo reel review.

Description: Continuation of concepts and techniques covered in MART 430. The principles of animation are covered in depth as they apply to the 3D environment: bipedal locomotion (walks, runs, gait changes), weight, balance, and character performance.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; Certificate of Achievement; CSU transferable.

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS AND JUSTIFICATIONS

MULTIMEDIA ART AND TECHNOLOGY

374 UX Research Methods (3.00) (day or evening)

Justification: Recommended by the Digital Art & Animation advisory board. Employment of UI/UX designers is projected to grow 13 percent from 2018 to 2028, much faster than the average for all occupations. Demand is driven by the growing popularity of mobile devices and e-commerce. According to Onward Search “UI designer” ranks third on this list of the 19 most in-demand digital creative talent for 2019. MART 374 is a core requirement for both the User Interface/User Experience Design AA Degree and Certificate of Achievement.

Prerequisite: None.

Recommended Preparation: Eligibility for READ 836 and ENGL 836; or ENGL 847 or ESL 400.

Description: Introduction to the essentials of user experience (UX) research. This class teaches the basics of user experience research methodology, planning, and execution with industry-standard tools, including docs, spreadsheets, study administering and data gathering software, prototypes, and presentation slides. Practical application of skills learned to inform product development and UX design are also covered.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; Certificate of Achievement; CSU transferable.

392 CONTENT STRATEGY AND UX WRITING (3.00) (day or evening)

Justification: Recommended from the Digital Art & Animation advisory board. Employment of UI/UX designers is projected to grow 13 percent from 2018 to 2028, much faster than the average for all occupations. Demand is driven by the growing popularity of mobile devices and e-commerce. According to Onward Search “UI designer” ranks third on this list of the 19 most in-demand digital creative talent

for 2019. MART 392 is a core requirement for both the User Interface/User Experience Design AA Degree and Certificate of Achievement.

Prerequisite: None.

Recommended Preparation: Eligibility for READ 836 and ENGL 836; or ENGL 847 or ESL 400.

Description: Introduction to the essentials of content strategy and user experience (UX) writing. This class teaches the basics of information architecture, writing for user interfaces, and content management with industry-standard tools, including docs, spreadsheets, design software, and presentation slides. Practical application of skills learned to develop content for user interfaces are also covered.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; Certificate of Achievement; CSU transferable.

393 UX DATA VISUALIZATION (3.00) (day or evening)

Justification: Recommended from the Digital Art & Animation advisory board. Employment of UI/UX designers is projected to grow 13 percent from 2018 to 2028, much faster than the average for all occupations. Demand is driven by the growing popularity of mobile devices and e-commerce. According to Onward Search “UI designer” ranks third on this list of the 19 most in-demand digital creative talent for 2019. MART 393 is a core requirement for both the User Interface/User Experience Design AA Degree and Certificate of Achievement.

Prerequisite: None.

Recommended Preparation: Eligibility for READ 836 and ENGL 836; or ENGL 847 or ESL 400.

Description: This course provides an introduction as well as hands-on experience in data visualization for user experience (UX). It introduces students to the theory and design principles for creating meaningful displays of quantitative and qualitative data to facilitate decision-making and design modifications or choices.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; Certificate of Achievement; CSU transferable.

394 INTERACTION DESIGN (3.00) (day or evening)

Justification: Recommended from the Digital Art & Animation advisory board. Employment of UI/UX designers is projected to grow 13 percent from 2018 to 2028, much faster than the average for all occupations. Demand is driven by the growing popularity of mobile devices and e-commerce. According to Onward Search “UI designer” ranks third on this list of the 19 most in-demand digital creative talent for 2019. MART 394 is a core requirement for both the User Interface/User Experience Design AA Degree and Certificate of Achievement.

Prerequisite: None.

Recommended Preparation: Eligibility for READ 836 and ENGL 836; or ENGL 847 or ESL 400.

Description: This course covers the essentials of interaction and visual design principles and how they are applied. Students learn how to evaluate and analyze the uses of interactive media and understand how viewing interactive media on a variety of screen sizes and devices may impact the experience. They also learn how to apply the principles of design and usability when creating interactive content.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; Certificate of Achievement; CSU transferable.

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS AND JUSTIFICATIONS

BUSINESS

113 PERSONAL FINANCE (3.00) (day or evening)

Justification: This course on personal finance provides students with a basic understanding of money, financial literacy and the foundations for financial independence. The curriculum has been requested by students, counselors, and advisory board members. This course has been developed collaboratively with business faculty, math faculty, and our articulation officer with support for this course in CSU area credit. The course is also a selective course requirement for the Business Administration A.S. Degree program.

Prerequisite: MATH 110 or appropriate score on the College Placement Test or other multiple measures assessment.

Recommended Preparation: None.

Description: This course in personal finance leads students toward financial literacy and enables students to obtain the foundation for a lifelong understanding of the basics of finance including money management, tax planning, investing, and retirement planning. Students learn to apply and use financial models through critical thinking, quantitative reasoning, and developing problem-solving abilities. Emphasis is placed on learning the fundamental concepts of everyday finance with a hands-on approach.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; CSU transferable.

KINESIOLOGY, ATHLETICS AND DANCE: AQUATICS

127.1 SWIM STROKE DEVELOPMENT I (1.00) (day or evening)

Justification: Swim Stroke Development I introduces students to the foundational skills needed to perform the freestyle, breaststroke, backstroke and butterfly stroke. The course is the first of a series that examines swimming mechanics while also increasing overall fitness. Students are able to apply this course towards an AA Degree in Kinesiology. The new Cañada College Fitness and Wellness Center, including a state of the art aquatic facility (2 pools), opens spring 2021.

Prerequisite: None.

Recommended Preparation: Eligibility for READ 836 and ENGL 836; or ENGL 847 or ESL 400.

Description: A swimming course designed to expose students to the benefits of aerobic exercise through swimming. The focus is on the development of stroke mechanics including the free style, butterfly, back stroke, and breast stroke. Must be able to swim one length without touching the bottom or side walls.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; CSU transferable.

127.2 SWIM STROKE DEVELOPMENT II (1.00) (day or evening)

Justification: Swim Stroke Development II continues to build the fundamental skills needed to perform the freestyle, breaststroke, backstroke and butterfly stroke at a beginner to intermediate level. The course is the second of a series that examines swimming mechanics while also increasing overall fitness. Students are able to apply this course towards an AA Degree in Kinesiology. The new Cañada College Fitness and Wellness Center, includes a state of the art aquatic facility (2 pools), and opens spring 2021.

Prerequisite: AQUA 127.1

Recommended Preparation: None.

Description: Continuation of AQUA 127.1. A swimming course designed to expose students to the benefits of aerobic exercise through swimming. The focus is on the development of stroke mechanics including the free style, butterfly, back stroke, and breast stroke.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; CSU transferable.

KINESIOLOGY, ATHLETICS AND DANCE: DANCE

117.1 TAP DANCE I (1.00) (day or evening)

Justification: This course is being added in order to expand our course offerings that align with the planning of the upcoming new building. The class is a selective requirement for the Dance and Kinesiology Associate of Arts Degrees.

Prerequisite: None.

Recommended Preparation: Eligibility for READ 836 and ENGL 836; or ENGL 847 or ESL 400.

Description: This course covers beginning tap dance technique, tap vocabulary, dance combinations and rhythmic patterns while developing musicality and basic performance skills. Opportunities are available to perform, in order to better appreciate tap dance. Choreography and improvisational group projects/presentations are developed over the course of the semester.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; CSU transferable.

117.2 TAP DANCE II (1.00) (day or evening)

Justification: This course is being added in order to expand our course offerings that align with the planning of the upcoming new building. The class is a selective requirement for the Dance and Kinesiology Associate of Arts Degrees.

Prerequisite: DANC 117.1

Recommended Preparation: None.

Description: Continuation of DANC 117.1. This course covers intermediate tap dance technique, tap vocabulary, dance combinations and rhythmic patterns while developing musicality and basic performance skills. Opportunities are available to perform, in order to better appreciate tap dance. Choreography and improvisational group projects/presentations are developed over the course of the semester.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; CSU transferable.

117.3 TAP DANCE III (1.00) (day or evening)

Justification: This course is being added in order to expand our course offerings that align with the planning of the upcoming new building. The class is a selective requirement for the Dance and Kinesiology Associate of Arts Degrees.

Prerequisite: DANC 117.2

Recommended Preparation: None.

Description: Continuation of DANC 117.2. This course covers intermediate to advanced tap dance technique, tap vocabulary, dance combinations and rhythmic patterns while developing musicality and basic performance skills. Opportunities are available to perform, in order to better appreciate tap dance. Choreography and improvisational group projects/presentations are developed over the course of the semester.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; CSU transferable.

117.4 TAP DANCE IV (1.00) (day or evening)

Justification: This course is being added in order to expand our course offerings that align with the planning of the upcoming new building. The class is a selective requirement for the Dance and Kinesiology Associate of Arts Degrees.

Prerequisite: DANC 117.3

Recommended Preparation: None.

Description: Continuation of DANC 117.3. This course covers advanced tap dance technique, tap vocabulary, dance combinations and rhythmic patterns while developing musicality and basic performance skills. Opportunities are available to perform, in order to better appreciate tap dance. Choreography and improvisational group projects/presentations are developed over the course of the semester.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; CSU transferable.

161.1 TANGO ARGENTINO I (1.00) (day or evening)

Justification: This course is being added in order to expand our course offerings that align with the planning of the upcoming new building. The class is a selective requirement for the Dance and Kinesiology Associate of Arts Degrees.

Prerequisite: None.

Recommended Preparation: Eligibility for READ 836 and ENGL 836; or ENGL 847 or ESL 400.

Description: This course is designed to introduce students to the essence of beginning level Argentine Tango (the dance of love) as well as basic improvisational skills. 161.2 TANGO ARGENTINO II (1.00) (day or evening)

Recommended Preparation: None.

128.1 CORE STRENGTH AND FUNCTIONAL TRAINING I (1.00) (day or evening)

The course is suitable for students at an intermediate fitness level and prepares participants for all types of physical activity from everyday movement to athletic engagement.

301.1 SPINNING I (1.00) (day or evening)

Justification: This course is being added in order to expand our course offerings that align with the planning of the upcoming new building. The class is a selective requirement for the Kinesiology Associate of Arts Degree.

301.2 SPINNING II (1.00) (day or evening)

121.1 BADMINTON I (1.00) (day or evening)

Justification: Badminton I introduces students to the foundational skills needed to participate at a beginner to intermediate level. The course is the first of a series that examines and practices the basic fundamentals of badminton while also increasing general fitness. Students are able to apply this course towards an AA Degree in Kinesiology. The new Cañada College Fitness and Wellness Center opens spring 2021, and includes a state of the art gymnasium.

Prerequisite: None.

Recommended Preparation: Eligibility for READ 836 and ENGL 836; or ENGL 847 or ESL 400.

Description: A course designed to provide instruction and practice in the fundamentals of badminton: rules and strategies, grip, strokes, footwork, and court coverage, drills and competition, tournaments in singles and doubles.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; CSU transferable.

121.2 BADMINTON II (1.00) (day or evening)

Justification: Badminton II continues to build the mechanics, techniques, strategies and foundational skills needed to participate at an intermediate to advanced level. The course is the second in a series that enables students to increase overall fitness while practicing and playing badminton. Students are able to apply this course towards an AA Degree in Kinesiology. The new Cañada College Fitness and Wellness Center, including a state of the art gymnasium, opens spring 2021.

Prerequisite: INDV 121.1

Recommended Preparation: None.

Description: Continuation of INDV 121.1. Designed to provide instruction and practice in the fundamentals of badminton at an intermediate level: rules and strategies, grip, strokes, footwork, and court coverage, drills and competition, tournaments in singles and doubles.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; CSU transferable.

KINESIOLOGY, ATHLETICS AND DANCE: VARSITY SPORTS

300 VARSITY BASKETBALL: WOMEN (1.50) (day or evening)

Justification: The addition of this course enables student-athletes to examine and practice the technical skills, mechanics, tactics and strategies of basketball needed to compete at the intercollegiate level. Students are able to apply this course towards an AA Degree in Kinesiology. Student body polling, per the CCCAA R-4 Statement of Compliance of Title IX Gender Equity, identified women's basketball to be among the top three intercollegiate sports of interest not currently offered. The new Cañada College Fitness and Wellness Center, with a state of the art basketball facility, opens spring 2021.

Prerequisite: Demonstrated ability. Student-athletes must be enrolled in 12 units.

Recommended Preparation: Eligibility for READ 836 and ENGL 836; or ENGL 847 or ESL 400.

Description: Consists of Intercollegiate Women's Basketball competition in the Coast Conference. The team also participates in regional tournaments, the Northern California playoffs and the state championships when qualified. May be repeated for credit up to 3 times.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; CSU transferable.

350 WOMEN'S VARSITY BADMINTON (3.00) (day or evening)

Justification: The addition of this course enables student-athletes to examine and practice the mechanics of badminton while competing at the intercollegiate level. The new Cañada College Fitness and Wellness Center, with a state of the art gymnasium, opens spring 2021. Student body polling, per the CCCAA R-4 Statement of Compliance of Title IX Gender Equity, identified women's badminton to be among the top three intercollegiate sports of interest not currently offered. Students are able to apply this course towards an AA Degree in Kinesiology.

Prerequisite: Demonstrated ability. Student-athletes must be enrolled in 12 units.

Recommended Preparation: Eligibility for READ 836 and ENGL 836; or ENGL 847 or ESL 400.

Description: Consists of Intercollegiate Women's Badminton competition in the Coast Conference. The team also participates in regional tournaments, the Northern California playoffs and the state championships when qualified. May be repeated for credit up to 3 times.

Students will be able to apply this course towards an AA Degree in Kinesiology.

Prerequisite: Demonstrated ability. Student-athletes must be enrolled in 12 units.

Recommended Preparation: Eligibility for READ 836 and ENGL 836; or ENGL 847 or ESL 400.

Description: Consists of Intercollegiate Women's Water Polo competition in the Coast Conference. The team also participates in regional tournaments, the Northern California playoffs and the state championships when qualified. May be repeated for credit up to 3 times.

Classification: AA/AS Degree; CSU transferable.
