Description:	This course is designed to allow students to acquire a level of global competence with an emphasis on Italian life and culture while enrolled in the Los Rios Study Abroad program. Global competence is a continuing process of acquiring specific economic, historical, and geo-political knowledge, which supports the intercultural communication skills and authentic lived experiences that allow a person to function in another culture and result in attitudes of cultural appreciation and interdependence. While participating in a specific Study Abroad program the student will have

opportunities to study and generally survey the host country's historical, cultural, and geopolitical influences, as well as the societal structures, to develop an understanding and appreciation of the host culture as different from U. Section 3: Learning Outcomes and Objectives

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- identify aspects of social, physical, and/or emotional well-being for the community while considering present and future conditions in society.
- incorporate specific cultural, geopolitical, economic, and social knowledge into academic and personal contexts for an understanding of global competence.
- analyze personal beliefs, values, and attitudes about the host culture that the student had prior to an intercultural experience and aspects of ethnocentric behavior that can occur within intercultural communication and relations.
- demonstrate an understanding of concepts of physical and emotional wellness to make wise lifestyle choices and develop these skills and competencies to understand him/herself as a whole person (integral to his/her environment).
- identify, analyze, articulate and describe the effects of intercultural experiences upon physical and emotional wellness while immersed in a country different than one's native country.
- appreciate visual, historical, and experiential cultural products of cultures different from the student's own.
- identify and explain aspects of culture shock and techniques to cope and reduce its affects on physical and emotional wellness.
- describe the value of international travel as a part of lifelong learning and personal wellness.
- participate in the larger community beyond campus in a positive manner demonstrating an understanding of personal responsibility in the larger context.
- undertake thoughtful consideration of divergent points of view and utilize multiple perspectives in considering information.
- develop a foundation for cultural pluralism, a rejection of previous personal prejudices, and knowledge of and comfort with others unlike oneself.

The topics for this course are typically allocated as follows:

- 6 Historical background in the region (in general terms of major developments, such as the Bronze Age and Etruscan eras, circa 1000 BC 510 BC, the Roman Empire era, circa 509 BC 553 AD, the Italian Middle Ages with monarchies and the Papacy, circa 553 AD 1300 AD, the establishment of the Holy Roman Empire and the Italian Renaissance era, circa 1300 AD 1735 AD, the Italian Unification and Kingdom era, circa 1735 AD 1918 AD, the Fascist Period and Italy's role in World War I and II, circa 1918 1945 AD, the Post War Italian era leading up to the volatile transition to democracy and the modern government, circa 1945 AD present, particularly in terms of influential leaders or public figures that were established within these eras)
- 6 Geopolitical and economic background and influences in the region (in general terms of major developments, such as the Italian economic and political influences of Roman Empire with Western European nations during the Middle-Ages and the Italian imperial era, the trade routes since the Middle-Ages, the colonization efforts during the 1700s and 1800s, the role of the Holy Roman Empire, and the examination of the modern geopolitical and economic influences)
- 12 Cultural beliefs, values, attitudes, and patterns that have developed within the culture of this region; traditional and contemporary cultural customs and social expectations prevalent in the culture are identified, explained, demonstrated, and explored; comparison and contrast between the cultural patterns of the region and the contemporary, typically prevalent U.S. American
- 6 Description, explanation, and demonstration of the foods, diet, gastronomy, social habits, and etiquette for this region
- 6 The historical and/or popular landmarks, structures, and places of social gatherings are identified explained in terms of historical and social significance for the region, particularly, any places that have been visited and attended by the students.
- 6 Identification, description, and explanation of the recreational, sports, and popular leisure activities that have been a pastime or contemporary social practice within the region
- 12 Mid-term and final assessment, including written assignments, reflective journal writing, objective examination (multiple-choice, quizzes, short answer essays, etc.), and/or oral presentations individually or as part of a small group experience

Section 6: Instruction Methods and In-class Activities

In-Person Delivery Modality

Group assignments may require students to research and elucidate fundamental concepts of introductory concepts and theories and apply them to concepts of intercultural communication. Media presentation (video, audio and/or music segments) which depict key sociological and communication concepts may be analyzed individually and/or in small groups.

Example: Analyze and interpret the underlying differences and similarities between regional Italian cultures. Specifically, identify and analyze one important cultural difference and one similarity between Sicilian and Tuscan cultures.

Hybrid - Online and Onsite Delivery Modality

Evaluation methods may include written work, including reaction papers to sociological topics. The evaluation method must include the student's participation in group and class discussion within the class sessions, so attendance is necessary and vital for observation of the student's learning. As part of the study abroad program, students will be required to attend and participate in field trips within the region. Online components will be assessed accordingly.
