Minutes of the Study Session of the Board of Trustees San Mateo County Community College District March 12, 2008 San Mateo, CA

The meeting was called to order at 6:05 p.m.

Pledge of Allegiance

DISCUSSION OF THE ORDER OF THE AGENDA

Trustee Miljanich proposed an item to be added to the end of the agenda to discuss the board's response to recent actions taken by the leadership of the AFT.

It was moved by Trustee Hausman and seconded by Vice President Schwarz to add the agenda item "Discussion of Board's response to recent actions taken by AFT leadership" to the end of the study session. The motion carried, all members voting "Aye."

MINUTES

It was moved by Trustee Hausman and seconded by Vice President Schwarz to approve the minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Board of February 27, 2008.

President Holober asked to amend the minutes on page 6 under the item APPRVOAL TO EXECUTE AN AGREEMENT WITH MANAGEMENT & POLICE CONSULTING, LLC FOR ORGANIZATIONAL ASSESSMENT OF SECURITY OPERATIONS – DISTRICTWIDE (08-2-108B) to change the phrase "having uniformed people on the campuses" to "having sworn peace officers on the campuses". After this discussion, the motion carried, all members voting "Aye."

NEW BUSINESS

APPROVAL OF PERSONNEL ACTIONS: CHANGES IN ASSIGNMENT, COMPENSATION, PLACEMENT, LEAVES, STAFF ALLOCATIONS AND CLASSIFICATION OF ACADMIC AND CLASSIFIED PERSONNEL (08-3-1A)

It was moved by Trustee Hausman and seconded by Trustee Miljanich to approve the actions in Board Report No. 08-3-1A. The motion carried, all members voting "Aye."

APPROVAL OF SAN MATEO COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT PROPOSED 2008 BOARD GOALS (08-3-1B)

It was moved by Vice President Schwarz and seconded by Trustee Miljanich to approve the Proposed 2008 Board Goals. The motion carried, all members voting "Aye."

APPROVAL OF RECOMMENDATIONS FOR TITLES OF CERTIFICATES (08-3-2B)

It was moved by Vice President Schwarz and seconded by Trustee Hausman to accept the certificate titles as outlined in the board report. Trustee Hausman asked what an example of a certificate under 12 units

would be. Vice President Stroud said that an example might be a certificate in ESL or a certificate in a variety of computer applications. She also explained further that certificates for programs 18 units and over must go to the state for approval. Certificates for programs between 12 and 17.5 units can go to the state for approval if the District desires, however it is not necessary. It is, however, necessary to rename these lower unit certificates, and the Board of Trustees must approve the names. Trustee Hausman asked if the board were naming the areas of study on the certificate. Vice President Stroud explained that the areas of study in which certificates are granted are initiated through the College curriculum committees and that the Board is only deciding the name to give to the certificate, ie certificate of achievement, or certificate of completion. Chancellor Galatolo noted that this is really a technical issue dictated by statute. After this discussion, the motion carried, all members voting "Aye".

STUDY SESSION

CAREER TECHNICAL EDUCATION (CTE); APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAMS (INCLUDING DISCUSSION OF THE LOCATION AND FIT OF CAREER/TECHNICAL/APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAMS AT EACH COLLEGE) (08-3-1C)

Vice Chancellor Luan began the discussion by reiterating the importance of the study session topic. He indicated that 20% or more of the District's FTES come from CTE coursework. He brought the Board's attention to a hard copy of a Powerpoint presentation to be used as the guide for the evening's discussion and asked the presenters to introduce themselves. The presenters were: Linda Hayes, Dean of Workforce Development at Cañada College; Ken San Filippo, Administrator for the San Mateo County Regional Occupational Programs and Services (ROP); Martha Tilmann, Dean of Coastside and Special Projects at College of San Mateo and Regina Stroud, Vice President of Instruction at Skyline College.

Vice President Stroud discussed background and regulations surrounding CTE. She noted that the District has a wide array of CTE programs, which have recently been highlighted in the "Find your Future Here" brochure which was distributed to the Board. She noted that the Colleges' Faculty, Staff and administration work in regional collaborative with other regional Deans, CIOs, Faculty and administrators and forge partnerships with business and industry to meet current workforce needs. Vice President Stroud also pointed out that the main Federal authority and regulations behind Career Technical Education is centered in the Workforce Investment Act (WIA) and of the \$500 million allocated to that Federal program, about \$20 Million is allocated to Career Technical Education. She reminded the Board that the EDGE Campaign, which the board endorsed at an earlier meeting, showed the Board's recognition of the importance of CTE programs, and the importance of the role the community college system plays in those programs, to the economic vitality of the region.

Vice Chancellor Luan presented select environmental scanning data related to job demand in the region, information from the 2008 Community needs survey and CTE enrollment statistics.

Dean Tilmann spoke about the Apprenticeship Program and the Skilled Trades Preparation Program. She noted that these programs and their curriculum are developed and taught by industry professionals. Benefits for the district in conducting these programs are not monetary, rather they are indirect benefits like establishing relationships with participating institutions and demonstrating the District's interest in the programs. She noted that a Skilled Trades Preparation Program will start April 14th on the Coast.

Dean Hayes spoke about the Tech Prep model. She noted that the program has been in existence for 12 years and is well established throughout high schools and community colleges. This model encourages collaboration between faculty, administrators and staff at the high school and community college level. The program makes it possible for students to take high school CTE classes that have been articulated with high schools. When they transfer to a community college within SMCCD, the high school CTE credits will be recognized on the college transcript after the student successfully completes six units of

community college courses. She noted that the three Colleges receive funding for the program and share that funding with the high schools.

Ken San Filippo provided some background information on the county ROP program and talked about recent legislation mandating a change in focus of this program from adults to high school students. He noted that at the high school level, the legislation requires sequenced courses as opposed to stand alone courses. He also noted that the adult population who will no longer be served by the ROP will most likely be looking at the community college to fill that gap.

Vice President Stroud spoke about the opportunities of the contextualized learning of the CTE coursework. As an example, she referenced the Biotech program at Skyline. In that model, students learn math in the context of Biotech. They also receive student support services like counseling and tutoring. Because of the contextual nature of the program, faculty within the program also collaborate regularly.

At this point, Vice Chancellor Luan invited questions from the Trustees.

Trustee Hausman asked about the qualifications necessary for a student to enter the Apprenticeship program. Dean Tilmann noted that "soft skills" were necessary, i.e. being on time, being responsible to a supervisor. She noted that there are career courses that help prepare students in this area. She noted that students need a little bit of several different areas in math including geometry and calculus, and noted that a math and technology class is being developed to feed into some of these programs. Dean Tilmann noted that the students must be able to read and write English. She mentioned an interest in adding a coop component to the various construction projects that are occurring across the District. Trustee Hausman asked if students needed letters of recommendation and Dean Tilmann said that they did not, but that they needed an oral interview, a physical and also a High School Diploma or a GED. Vice President Schwarz asked if the apprentices need to be currently employed and a union member in order to join the program and Dean Tilmann said they did not need to be. Trustee Holober noted that there is a distinction between the apprenticeship programs and the skilled trades preparation program and that those students in the apprenticeship program are union members at the time they enter the program and are sponsored by the union. Trustee Hausman asked if there is a specific student/teacher ratio and Dean Tilmann indicated that there is not and it really depends on the program. Chancellor Galatolo noted that some program costs are higher than others and that these are forces that are out of the college's control.

Trustee Mandelkern asked about how the environmental scanning data is used in program planning and development. Vice President Stroud said that the information is used in a variety of college planning mechanisms including the education master plan and program review. Trustee Mandelkern asked if this data is used in District level planning related to program offerings. Vice Chancellor Luan indicated that the District Strategic Plan is underway and the environmental scanning informs the District Strategic Plan. Trustee Mandelkern noted that the Careers brochure lists many programs and that there are a number of programs that are duplicated at various colleges. He asked how, especially in programs with high costs, decisions are made in deciding whether programs are duplicated at various campuses. Vice President Stroud noted that in many cases the service areas for programs are distinct and the duplication is necessary. At this point, President Mohr indicated the he strongly believes there is a need for centrality and that there is a need for the Colleges to come together, to look at the competitive forces, and to look at program duplication in a hard-minded fashion. Chancellor Galatolo said that he has discussed this issue with the presidents. He said that it is important for the Colleges to have the ability to adapt and react to community needs. He noted that we need be forward thinking in how we adopt, eliminate and add programs. Trustee Mandelkern noted that he believes that there should be a centralized district level process in this type of planning. Chancellor Galatolo concurred that there is no district level evaluative process and reiterated that the District Strategic Planning process is underway.

Trustee Miljanich asked about for clarification on the environmental scanning data, specifically the group referred to as "Group 1". Vice Chancellor Luan noted that this group is comprised of those who indicated an interest in taking CTE classes. She asked that if in our assessment we are taking into consideration the various specialized schools in the area. Vice Chancellor Luan said that we are looking at competitors within a 30 mile radius. He also noted that he would like to work with the Vice Presidents in the area of coordinating course and program offerings. President Claire added that the specialized school leadership are business people and that they are very savvy at marketing and are formidable competitors.

At this point in the meeting, Vice Chancellor Nuñez notified Chancellor Galatolo that there had been a bomb threat to the building and there was a need to evacuate.

President Holober called for a recess until the situation could be assessed. The meeting recessed at 7:25PM. After gathering at a muster point outside the building, and having been given a briefing by Chancellor Galatolo and the San Mateo Police department, Trustee Miljanich moved and Vice President Schwarz seconded that the meeting be adjourned. The motion carried, all members voting "Aye", and the meeting adjourned at 7:35PM.

HIGHLIGHTS OF CENSUS COMPARISONS

Compared to the Census Date of Spring 2007, Spring 2008 Census' slice of time data showed the following changes:

District as a Whole (SMCCCD)

The overall percentage distribution of student headcounts at three colleges remained relatively stable: 24.9% Cañada, 41% CSM and 34.1% Skyline.

The total student headcounts in Spring 2008 were 26,589. Compared to Spring 2007, the total district student headcounts increased by 1,422 students, or 5.7%.

Compared to Spring 2007, all age groups increased, except for the less than 18 group. Most noticeably the 18-20 age group increased by 425 (6.5%) and the 25-29 age group increased by 313 (9.3%).

Compared to Spring 2007, returning transfer students increased by 215 (16.3%). Continuing students increased by 1,277 (7.5%). Concurrently enrolled students remained almost unchanged.

Cañada College

Cañada college's total student headcounts in Spring 2008 were 6,631. Compared to Spring 2007, the total college student headcounts increased by 401 students, or 6.4%.

Compared to Spring 2007, all age groups increased. The 21-24 and 25-29 age groups increased the most, 11% and 16.1% respectively.

Compared to Spring 2007, all student types increased, except for the returning students who decreased by 102 (-13.7%). The concurrently enrolled students increased by 11.5%.

Only 21% of the student body was full-time. Full-time students increased by 121, or 9.4%, while part-time students increased by 280 or 5.7%.

College of San Mateo

CSM's total student headcounts in Spring 2008 were 10,899. Compared to Spring 2007, the total college student headcounts increased by 326 students, or 3.1%.

Compared to Spring 2007, there was a decrease of 104 students below the age of 18 (19.5% decrease) in Spring 2008. Age groups of 18-29, 40-59, however, experienced increases.

Compared to Spring 2007, concurrently enrolled students decreased by 114 (-20.5%) in Spring 2008. Day/Evening students had a 10.9% increase and Evening students also increased by 6.4%. Day students, however, dropped by -3.0%.

Only 28% of the student body was full-time. Full-time students increased by 178, or 6.3%, while part-time students increased by 148 or 1.9%.

Skyline College

Skyline's total student headcounts in Spring 2008 were 9,059. Compared to Spring 2007, the total college student headcounts increased by 695 students, or 8.3%.

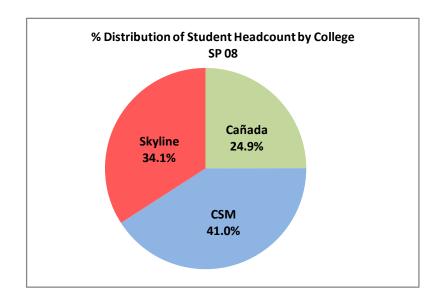
Compared to Spring 2007, all age groups increased, except for the age group of 40-59, which decreased by -1.6%.

Compared to Spring 2007, all student types increased. Concurrently enrolled students increased by 59 (28.9%) in Spring 2008.

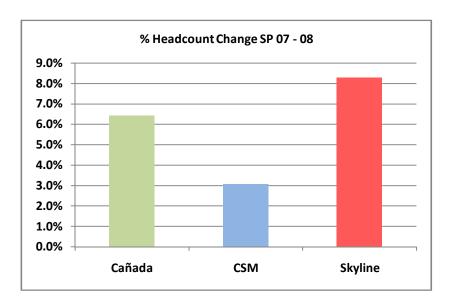
Only 28% of the student body was full-time. Full-time students increased by 252, or 11.1%, while part-time students increased by 443 or 7.3%.

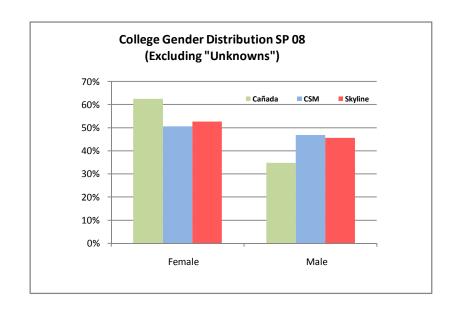

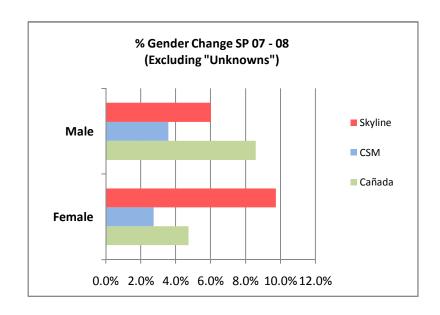
OVERVIEW SP 2008



CHANGE SINCE SP 2007

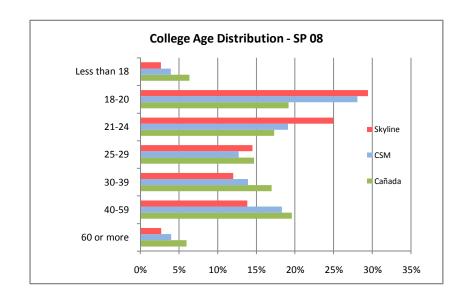


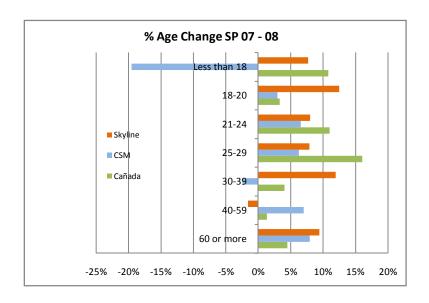


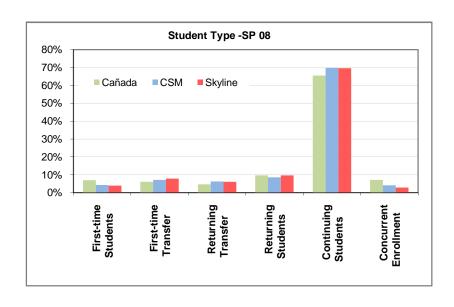


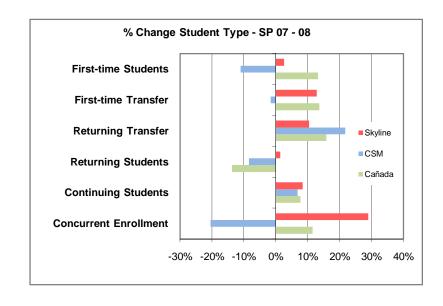

#### APPROVAL OF INCREASE IN STUDENT HEALTH SERVICES FEE

Education Code Section 76355 provides the governing board of a community college district the authority to increase the student health services fee by the same percentage as the increase in the Implicit Price Deflator for State and Local Government Purchase of Goods and Services. Whenever that calculation produces an increase of \$1 above the existing fee, the fee may be increased by \$1.

The California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office will typically inform all districts in April whether an increase is allowable. Registration will start shortly thereafter and there may not be sufficient time to get Board approval before the start of registration. In order for the District to be prepared for Summer and Fall 2008 registration and to avoid having students be billed retroactively, the Vice Presidents of Student Services are requesting the Board approve a \$1 increase effective with the Summer Session of 2008, contingent on state approval.

All fees collected pursuant to this section shall be deposited in the Student Health Fee Account in the Restricted General Fund of the District. These fees shall be expended only to provide health services as specified in regulations adopted by the Board of Governors. Allowable expenditures include health supervision and services, or the operation of a student health center, or both. Allowable expenditures exclude athletic-related salaries, services, insurance, insurance deductibles, or any other expense that is not available to all students. No student shall be denied a service supported by the student health fee on account of participation in athletic programs.

Currently, the District provides health services at a cost that exceeds the fee collected. Each year, the District files a State Mandated Cost Claim for the difference, although the State has not paid on these claims the last five years. The mandate remains.

The San Mateo County Community College District provides health services to students as required to sustain a "maintenance of effort" necessary to support its "mandated cost" claim submitted to the State each year. The mandated cost reimbursement guidelines call for the District to adjust its health fee charge to the maximum allowable to minimize the state's burden.

#### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that should the State Chancellor's Office authorize it, the Board of Trustees approve establishment of the District Student Health Fee at \$17 per semester and \$14 per summer session, effective Summer 2008 semester.

## APPROVAL TO EXECUTE AN AGREEMENT WITH COMMERCIAL ENERGY FOR PURCHASE OF CORE GAS

In these times of fluctuating natural gas prices, the District continues its efforts to find ways to reduce its utility expenses. Currently, the District's natural gas for core accounts is being fully serviced by Pacific Gas and Electric (PG&E). PG&E has stated that it is in the business of distributing energy and does not realize a profit on sales of the natural gas. Hence, PG&E encourages their customers to explore their options for purchasing gas, as a commodity, from a competitive energy supplier.

The District proposes to contract with Commercial Energy (CE), a third party supplier, for purchase of natural gas for all 8 of its core natural gas accounts. These core accounts represent approximately 40% of the District's usage. If CE fails to deliver gas, the District will continue to receive uninterrupted gas service directly from PG&E, billed at PG&E's normal rate. In either case, the District pays only for actual usage.

CE's advantage over PG&E is that its natural gas is produced locally. Consequently, CE 's storage costs are less than PG&E who purchases 85% of their supply out of state. Additionally, CE manages only customers who are in their production area. The Company not only provides the commodity but also helps their customers manage their accounts more efficiently.

The contract with CE would be for a 12-month term and renews monthly thereafter until a written non-renewal letter is received from the District. CE has several pricing options, but the District proposes to utilize the "target price" where it pays for each therm of gas delivered at a monthly price based on the prior month's PG&E Citygate price plus CE's risk management, fuel loss, interstate transportation and storage fees of \$0.075 per therm.

PG&E's Citygate price is the market price from third party suppliers as it enters into the PG&E system and has historically been about 5% below PG&E actual procurement rates. PG&E commodity rates have been fluctuating from \$0.74 to \$0.96 per therm in the past year while PG&E Citygate rates have been fluctuating from \$0.42 to \$0.76 per therm. A recent cost comparison shows the District would have saved approximately \$30,000 over PG&E rates in the last year if it had contracted with Commercial Energy at "target price."

#### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board authorize the Executive Vice Chancellor to execute an agreement with Commercial Energy of California, for provision of core gas, for a 12-month period beginning mid-April 2008 through mid-May 2008, with specific agreement dates to be determined when the contract is finalized and delivery commences.

#### CONTRACT AWARD FOR THE CAÑADA COLLEGE CONCESSION BUILDING PROJECT

This project involves the construction of a new 168 square foot building from which coffee, soda, prepackaged snacks and refreshments will be sold in the upper quad area. This project will provide a single story, steel-framed building with wood-infill stud wall, associated electrical and plumbing work, casework and countertops. This concession building will allow students, faculty and staff to take full advantage of the park-like environment that has been created by the completion of the new Library and Student Resource Center and the central quad renovation.

In December 2007, the District contracted with Crosby Group, a pre-qualified structural engineering firm familiar with the work at the District properties, to prepare the plans and specifications for this project. On February 6 and 12, 2008, the District published a legal notice inviting pre-qualified general contractors to bid on this project. Eight firms attended the mandatory pre-bid conferences held on February 20 and 22, 2008. On March 12, 2008, five of the eight firms submitted the following bids:

Following bid submission, staff conducted due diligence investigation of the bids. Rodan Builders was the apparent low bidder. However, their bid was deemed non-responsive because they failed to meet the District's insurance rating requirement, which is based on historical safety records. The apparent second lowest bidder, Coast Side Associates, met the District's insurance and safety requirements and was deemed the lowest responsible, responsive bidder. Coast Side Associates is a small general contractor based in Half Moon Bay, CA and was prequalified as part of the 2008 Contractor Prequalification. Staff believes that Coast Side's bid reflects the current market cost of the building based on the number of bids received, the spread of the bids and the fact that the bidders received two to four bids from each subcontractor.

This project will be funded out of Measure "A" general obligation bond funds.

#### RECOMMENDATION

The District recommends that the Board of Trustees award a contract for the Cañada College Concession Building Project to Coast Side Associates in the amount of \$232,390.

#### APPROVAL OF CONSTRUCTION CONSULTANT

During the course of each year, the District retains various construction-consulting services, including engineers, architects and other specialists. The professional services required by the District in its Capital Improvement Program are temporary or specialized in nature and District employees do not provide such expertise. Services provided include architectural, engineering, master scheduling, program information and project controls, building commissioning, construction testing and inspection, environmental, documentation for construction planning, as required by the State Chancellor's office, and construction-related legal services. On February 27, 2008 (Board Report 08-2-106B), the board approved a list of eighteen construction consultants from the pre-qualified pool that the District expects to have under contract within the next six months in support of the planning and construction efforts.

Listed below is an additional construction consultant, G.R.D. Energy, that was inadvertently omitted from that list. Accordingly, the District is bringing this request to the Board to add GRD Energy, a prequalified vendor, to the list of consultants approved at the February 27, 2008 meeting.

Funding sources for construction consultant services include general obligation bond funds, State scheduled maintenance funds, State hazardous materials program funds, State funds approved for capital outlay projects, and a small portion of District funds.

#### RECOMMENDATION

The District recommends that the Board of Trustees approve these construction consultant services, as detailed above, in an amount not to exceed \$450,000.
