Board Candidates Meet at Cañada

Board candidates meeting at Cañada. On Wednesday, Oct. 11, seven candidates for the college board spoke at Cañada. Ted Reller, Cañada's Political Science professor was the host.

With two open seats on the board, the candidates are waiting eagerly to fill them.

One of the main issues to which most of the candidates spoke was affirmative action.

Yaya DeLuna, a history instructor at Foothill College, believed that one of the reasons she should be elected is because she's a minority. "Over the years, the board has not had any minorities on it, I believe now is the time it should," said an enthusiastic DeLuna.

Another of the candidates, Karen Robinson Keane also felt that the board should consider the demographics of our community and pay more attention to the ethnic backgrounds of the citizens.

Steven Glick, the Vice-President of the business-sponsored Bay Area Council, agreed with Robinson and DeLuna by ex-

pressing the need for more minority hiring.

Other issues discussed were the education programs for working people and child care.

Burlingame High School's assistant Principal Tullio "Til" Bertini said that he would like to see more adult educational programs, especially for those who have full-time jobs. His stance on child-care however was not as positive as the other six candidates, saying that he would have to research

both the needs and costs, to determine if it would be a valuable asset or an unnecessary expenditure.

Beth Kelly Bhatnager, an attorney and CSM instructor, also spoke strongly of her goals to develop programs attuned to the changing needs of the community's employers and students of all backgrounds and ages. On the subject of child care, she felt that, if elected, she would look for federal funding for such a project.

Agreeing with Bhatnager were candidates Helen Hausman and Maxine Gonzales. Both spoke of the need to serve the community as a whole, from newly graduated high school students pursuing an A.A. degree, to students of all ages wishing to enhance their lives through academic, leisure and personal enhancement courses.

All of the candidates appeared honest, capable and willing to try and reflect the community's needs as a member of the board.

November 7th is election day.



Capable Replacement

Colts Get New Basketball Coach

After a long and difficult search for a capable replacement for the departed basketball coach Al Klein, Cañada's president D. Robert Stiff has named Michael Legarza head coach for the '89-90 season.

Legarza, a former all-coast performer at Menlo college, comes to the position highly recommended by some of the nation's top basketball coaches. Mike Krzewski from Duke University's perennial final four cagers called Legarza "a student of the game," and Cañada's golf coach and committee selection member Jerry Drever said "great recommendations by coach K and Stanford's Mike Montgomery made the decision easier."

Jerry Tarkanian from UNLV's pre-season favorites said of Legarza "There is not

one in the country that could do a better job at Cañada."

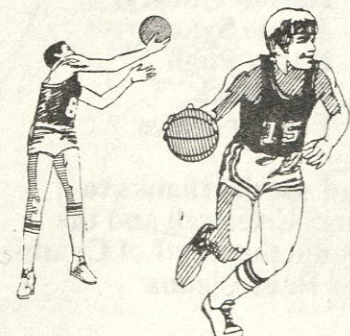
Cañada's basketball fortunes have been somewhat in limbo since Klein left for a high school coaching post in Idaho. Since that time Cañada's Anthropology professor Eldon Earnhardt has been conditioning and training this year's candidates. Earnhardt also served on the selection committee along with Drever, newly appointed Vice President Olivia Martinez, and committee Chair John Friesen, Humanities Division Director.

Legarza said "I am a man who genuinely cares about student/athletes and am confident I can develop a successful program at Cañada."

Committee members were unanimous in their choice of Legarza although the finalists for the full time position were "of

the highest caliber."

Legarza holds a BA in education from the University of Nevada in Reno and a Master's Degree in education from the University of San Diego. He will begin his assignment in early November.



Smoking Policy Working Here

Cañada's recently adopted 'No Smoking' policy needs help.

Smokers are respecting the new policy but the policy might not be respecting the smokers.

"The buildings need permanent 'No Smoking Beyond This Point' signs like they have over at Kaiser Hospital" says Angelo Festa, Cañada's instructor and proponent of the "No Smoking" laws.

"The problem arises when newcomers to Cañada who like to light up, end up being admonished by non-smoking students who are familiar with the "forbidden zones."

Perhaps these confrontations could be avoided if permanent signs were mounted on each building instead of the flimsy blue taped ones currently used.

The new policy has already had a positive effect on the Cañada faculty.

"I know of a few members of Cañada's staff who have considerably cut down on the number of cigarettes they smoke since the new policy took effect" said Festa.

According to the American Cancer Society, each time a smoker finished a cigarette, they have reduced their life span by 14 minutes. Therefore, Cañada's policy is saving lives.

In Festa's opinion, "the policy was long overdue; it's obviously working but now we need some new signs."



Movie Review

"When Harry Met Sally"

"What should I do tonight?"

Those were my thoughts last Friday night. I had ten bucks in my pocket beckoning me to go to the movies.

After paying \$6.50 to get in, I went over to the candy counter and bought a Ju-Ju Bee and a small cup of water (not really but you can't get much for \$3.50).

I finally found a seat after dodging all of the "gum-mines" dotting the floor. The curtains opened and the film began.

When Harry Met Sally is a Rob Reiner film starring Billy Crystal as "Harry" and Meg Ryan as "Sally."

The film begins with a walk back to 1977 at the University of Chicago. Reiner has done a super job of bringing back the styles and attitudes of that decade by showing the actors in their Bell-Bottom jeans and permed hair. Harry meets Sally for the first time when they share a ride to New York together after graduation.

When they arrive in New York, They separate and are ready to begin their new lives. Reiner leaves the audience guessing as to where This film go next. It's not a long wait as the scenario abruptly shifts into the

eighties.

Sideburns and Bell-Bottoms gone, a now married Harry meets up with Sally at the airport. The two barely recognize each other and Harry is clearly happier to see Sally than she is to see him.

The two separate again definitely not to Sally's dismay.

The film is a good half-hour old by the time the two meet again finally arriving in 1989.

Reiner uses situations that run parallel to many of today's students real personal events, giving the film the feeling of 'realism'. One of these real events is the trauma involved when a relationship fails.

The only disturbing part of this film is the mockery it makes of the institution of marriage. An example of this occurs when Harry is telling his two newly-wed friends how miserable they will be when, not if, they get a divorce. This film is more of drama than a comedy.

Meg Ryan does an outstanding job of acting and I think that she really does steal the show in this one.

This movie was well worth the \$6.50, but bring your own Ju-Ju Bees.

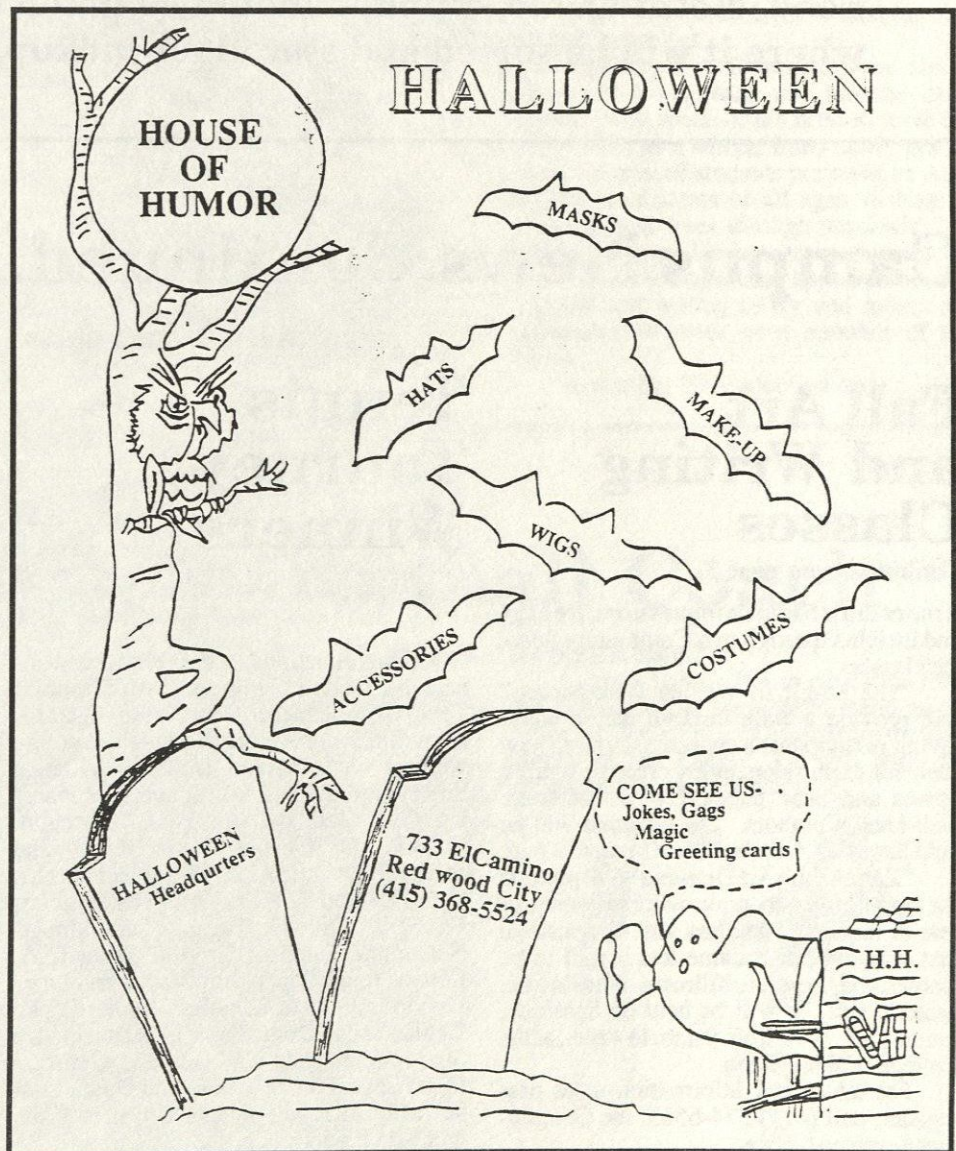
