# Students May Start Cafe

It's a brisk March morning and famished from the grueling test you've just taken you stumble toward the cafe to grab a steaming mug of espresso and a croissant. With the combined efforts of Dr. Grace Adams, Director of Business Administration, Tim Haenny, and ASCC this scenario may soon be a reality in the Canada cafeteria.

Dr. Adams is beginning a class this spring entitled Small Business Problem Solving. The focus is to give students information about running a small business and the problems that can arise. Students that enroll in this course will then have the option at the end of eight weeks to join ASCC in starting their own small business, a student-run cafe on campus.

Due to unsettled negotiations with the union workers who used to service the cafeteria, Canada has done with-



out one for over a year. However there is nothing in the contract which prevents a club organization. As Dr. Adams said, "We don't in any way want to violate the union contract."

In order to take part in the club that will run the cafe, students need to enroll in BUS 155. The course is also open to others, such as individuals interested in starting their own business, small business owners experiencing difficulty in running their business, and those who are just plain interested.

The course will consist of eight lecture hours for 1/2 unit of credit. Content will include some crucial aspects of running a business: personnel; business planning; financial information; affirmative action and hiring; city, county, and state regulations; order and purchasing; inventory control, and public relations and advertising.

According to Dr. Adams "the class is the backbone of the club." After the course hours are complete, students will begin work in the cafe, with the opening date near the beginning of March. Interior design students (ASID) have agreed to design the counters for the cafe.

The district has been very supportive of Canada starting a cafe. College of San Mateo's Cafe Internationale has proved to be very successful with the students and judging from the demand at Canada a cafe could be a very positive experience for all parties.

# Colts Upset in First Playoff Game

Going into the post season with a 15-1-1 record, the Canada men's soccer team was ranked first in Northern California and heavily favored against a visiting West Valley squad from Saratoga. West Valley was ranked 14th in the playoffs.

The Colts were upset by West Valley and eliminated from the playoffs after a great season. It was a very aggressive game from the beginning with both teams moving the ball fairly well but unable to score. As the game progressed, it was clear that the Colts were off their

game. Bad passes and missed opportunities plagued them throughout the game.

37:18 into the first half, West Valley broke the deadlock. With some good passing they moved the ball quickly up towards the Canada goal. Their first shot was blocked by diving Canada goalie, Mario Astorga, but he was unable to keep control of it and the ball bounced off his chest directly at the feet of West Valley's Michael Hackett who scored easily with Astorga still on the ground. The Colts ended the half with one missed opportunity on a shot that was wide to the right.

The second half started a little better for Canada as half-back Johnus Perrson came into the game after sitting out the first half with an injured knee. He, along with Mark Hepler, Gary Wratten and Alex Cooke were able to keep pressure on West Valley but were unable to score. The speed of the West Valley backfield was just too much for the Colts. On some good break away opportunities the Colts were just beaten to the ball.

With the lead, West Valley definitely played a defensive game with only a few shots on the Canada goal in the

New Program for Interior Design

Canada's Interior Design Program and the San Francisco Contract Design Center have gotten together to

present the first Health Care Interior Design Program in the country.

The 60 unit program, 30 units of core requirements and 30 units of specialized requirements, is designed to give students professional skills in the interior design of hospitals. It also provides opportunities for more specialization in fields such as children's care centers, dentist's offices, trauma centers, and centers for the elderly. The course will be taught by professionals who are practicing Bay Area Interior Designers and Architects, as well as Canada faculty from the Interior Design Program.

In addition to the classes that will be held at Canada, some of the classes will be held at the Contract Design Center which is located at 600 Townsend Street in San Francisco. This will enable students to get experience using modern hospital equipment that would otherwise not be available to Canada students enrolled in this type of program.

signer Sandra Bautista will have some exciting new costumes and the Canada Dance Club will have refreshments for the audience after the performance.

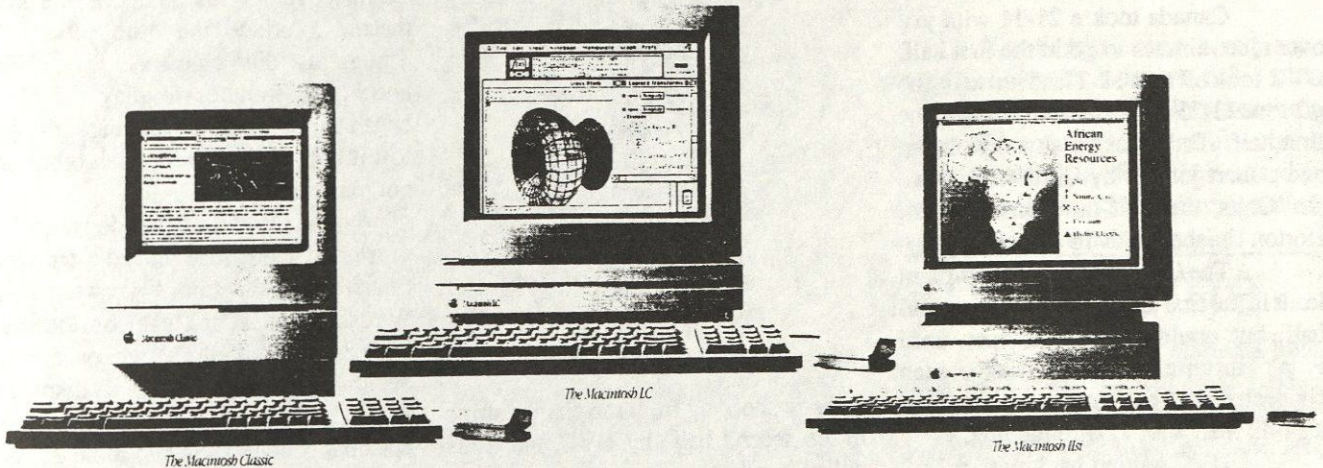
Featured vocalists are Laura Barton and Paul Price.

# Hoopsters Start Hot

## 5-1 Colts Set Scoring Record

Canada's men's basketball team is off to a 5-1 start and has already set a new Canada scoring record.

The Colts started their season in the Reno Shoot-Out with wins over Sacramento City College and Consumas. They pulled off a 89-81 victory over Sac. City and a 66-61 win over Consumas.

They came back to take an overtime victory over Fresno Pacific by a score of 74-71 in Fresno.

In the game in which the Colts set a new scoring record, the team scored 129 points while only giving up 67. Chris Grant led the way with 33 points and 15 rebounds. Serra High grad Vern Hubbard dumped in 24 points and ripped down 12 boards.

On Nov. 21, the Colts pulled out a 59-58 victory over Diablo Valley College in Pleasant Hill. This game was nip and tuck all the way down to the final buzzer.

Canada took a 21-11 with just over nine minutes to go in the first half. DVC took off on a 12-2 lead run to tie the game at 23-23 with 5:23 remaining in the first half. Dale Horton's reverse layup and a short jumper by Chris Grant gave the Colts the half-time lead, 27-24. Horton finished with 16 points.

The Colts built several six point leads in the first ten minutes of the second half, but couldn't break it open until Frank Hurtarte and Barry Danner each connected on 3-pointers to give the Colts a 51-40 lead with 7:09 remaining.

DVC battled back with a 13-2 run to knot things up again at 53 with 2:43 remaining.

The Colts never gave up the lead however. Joanus Prieda came down and buried a 3-pointer with 2:25 remaining.

The Colts had a 59-56 lead after Craig Henderson's free throw with :18 showing on the clock. DVC raced up the court and scored with six ticks remaining. After a Canada time out, the Colts

inbounded the ball to Henderson who was fouled immediately. Henderson went to the line and missed the front end of a 1-1 and DVC pulled down the rebound. The Vikings passed the ball up to half court where John Narvarez unleashed a beautiful shot that took everybody's breath away. The ball sailed through the air and just missed as it bounced off the front of the rim to end the game.

The Colts easily could have lost this game. They committed 22 fouls and had 15 turnovers. Thanks to some rather



pathetic shooting from the charity stripe in the second half by DVC, the Colts pulled it out.

Credit should be given where credit is due however. Being on the road, the Colts didn't lose their composure when DVC battled back. The game was low scoring and not typical of the Colts who are averaging 83 points a game in their victories. Head Coach Mike Legarza couldn't have utilized his time outs better. Even though it wasn't their day, they still pulled out the victory. That's a sure sign of a successful season to come.

## Mangiola Named Coach of the Year

Canada head soccer coach Frank Mangiola was named Coach of the Year for the Coast Conference in his first year at the helm. Mangiola led the Colts to a number one seed in the Nor Cal soccer playoffs.

Canada's Gary Wratten was named Most Valuable Player and to the Coast Conference first team.

Along with Wratten, Alex Cooke, Mark Hepler, and Mario Astorga also made the first team.

Players from Canada that were named to the second team are Juan Contreras, Carlos Romero, and Juan Carlos Martinez.
