Challenging New Academic Year

Welcome back to the 1991/92 academic year at Cañada College. I believe this year, perhaps more than anytime in the history of the college, will be a challenging and progressive year in our development. During the past five months, several organizational changes have been implemented in an effort to accomplish the following five collegewide goals:

1. Improve the cost of operation of the college.
2. Provide an annual budget with some discretionary funds.
3. Improve collegewide efficiency.
4. Increase enrollments.
5. Maintain excellence in educational programs and services.

During the upcoming year I will recommend that we continue to discuss reallocation of resources and budget savings through the process of program review, planning and budgeting for 1992/93. I continue to believe there are some economies

of operation that we as a college can and should implement to further proceed with the development of the college goals. It is essential that the recommended governance model be implemented as soon as possible to provide campus-wide input resources. I believe we are on the right track for a responsible system of budget management and shared decision-making for Cañada College. We must continue to be conservative in our approach, but at the same time, take strategic risks to accomplish Collegewide goals in support of instruction and support services for students. We cannot afford to do everything we would like at the funding level we are faced with. Program decisions must be based on Collegewide priorities that seek innovative solutions to the problems. We must identify external funding where possible, and keep a focus on the primary objectives of the College: teaching, learning and student success in the support of a diverse student body.

Student Run Cafeteria

Machine Replaced By People

A Corner of the Cañada cafeteria has been transformed into "Con Spirito," a student-run cafe featuring coffee, juice, mineral water and 'munchies.' Generally, the menu compliments the impersonal vending machine selection. However, soon the cafe will be serving espresso, croissants, and other pastries for those students and faculty who might have missed breakfast.

Con Spirito is currently open from 7:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. Monday through Friday and again from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and is staffed by students, who are not only paid but also earn a 1/2 unit of credit.

Dr. Grace Adams, the Dean of Business and Social Sciences at Cañada, said a settlement between the union that represents the employees of Cañada's original cafeteria and the district was required before any new food service could be introduced. Further, the students who work at Con Spirito must enroll in Bus. 155 (Small

Business Problem Solving), taught by local business owner Steve McLaughlin, a coffee importer. Therefore, the combination of the academic requirements and the near complete student control of the cafe have allowed its existence.

The College of San Mateo has had their own version for several years called "Cafe International." This highly profitable venture is loaning Cañada its original espresso coffee maker, which should be in place next month when counter and water facility construction is completed with the help of Cañada's Interior Design Department.

Dr. Adams says the initial \$15,000 budget is necessary to meet all the Health Department regulations. According to the guidelines for the cafe: All profits excluding the operating budget will be directed on a yearly basis to the A.S.C.C. general fund.

Tim Haenny, Coordinator of Student Activities, cites two reasons how Con Spirito became a reality: Business students' need for practical experience and the existing lack of food service at Cañada.

It's been over two years since Cañada had what nearly every high school student takes for granted--a cafeteria. According to Irene Bluth, Associate Chancellor of the San Mateo County Community Colleges, Cañada will have a district financed, operational cafeteria early next semester. The reopening of the cafeteria will not directly effect Con Spirito's progress.

Cañada's President, Doug Kechter says that the school is in an informational gathering stage and will begin accepting bids from food service companies soon.

A distinction between Con Spirito and the cafeteria is required. The former is an espresso and pastry shop with different items than what the proposed, fully operational cafeteria will offer. They are independently run but not in competition. The goals are different, but the result is more dining options for the entire Cañada College community.

'King Lear Is Near' - Opens in 'MAIN' Oct. 17

"How sharper than a serpents tooth it is to have a thankless child!" [King Lear]

The first production of the Cañada College Drama Department for Fall, 1991-1992, will be Shakespeare's KING LEAR, performed in the Main Theater on October 17, 18, 19, 24, 25 and 26, 1991.

This will be an "event", according to director William Kenney. The play has been in production for almost a year. "It's big in the sense that the company gets to use the Main Theater", as opposed to the Flex Theater. Usually only musical productions in the Spring get the privilege of the larger facility.

Kenney is very pleased with his cast of about twenty. At least three of the cast are full-time Cañada students, and they will receive full credit for their participation. "A lot of the actors are on the verge of being professional", says Kenney. The title role will be played by Robert Brauns, best known for his contributions at the Hillbarn Theater in Foster City. He is close to the age of King Lear. A touching point lies with Brauns' role - years ago (Kenney and Brauns have known each other for 40 years) Brauns gave Kenney his first start when he began acting. "It's a special play", muses Kenney.

Here's an overview of the play for those of you who need to brush up on your Shakespeare: the focus of the play is between King Lear and his daughters. Lear wants to give up his kingdom and retire. He's getting a little senile, and he decides to divide his kingdom up according to how much each of his daughters loves him. Cordelia, his youngest and favorite daughter, says she has to love her future husband as much as she loves her father. King Lear makes a very big mistake at this point (which this reporter will not reveal), and the remainder of the play revolves around the interaction and relationship of the family members. King Lear is faced with the knowledge that he is becoming older, but no wiser. Shakespeare then has him recovering from that self-realization.

For laymen, Kenney has reworded some of the elaborate Shakespearean language. He admits that "Shakespeare says a lot of things". And, though each phrase is as beautiful as the next, some of it had to be cut: "not much; just enough".

Traditional stagings are set in the Elizabethan or Renaissance periods; Kenney's production takes place in the Dark Ages, which lends a tragic affect to the play. Costume designer and makeup artist Kate Irvine is setting the colorful appearances in the 14th century, just before the Renaissance era.

In accordance with Kenney's idea, technical director and set designer Michael Walsh

has created a Stonehenge set. With the help of his two assistants, Patrick McKenna and Lori Palumbo, the set was largely constructed by the summer class of Drama 305. This is a hands-on class, and units vary according to the hours the student puts in. This should appeal to those who have hankering to work with their hands. There are no pre-requisites; a student can be of any skill level. This is a unique class: "The students receive personalized instruction," assures Walsh. What a rare commodity in today's days of budget cutbacks, overcrowded classrooms and teacher shortages. Walsh brings his ten-plus years of experience in set building and

design to the "classroom" (the scene shop behind the Main Theater).

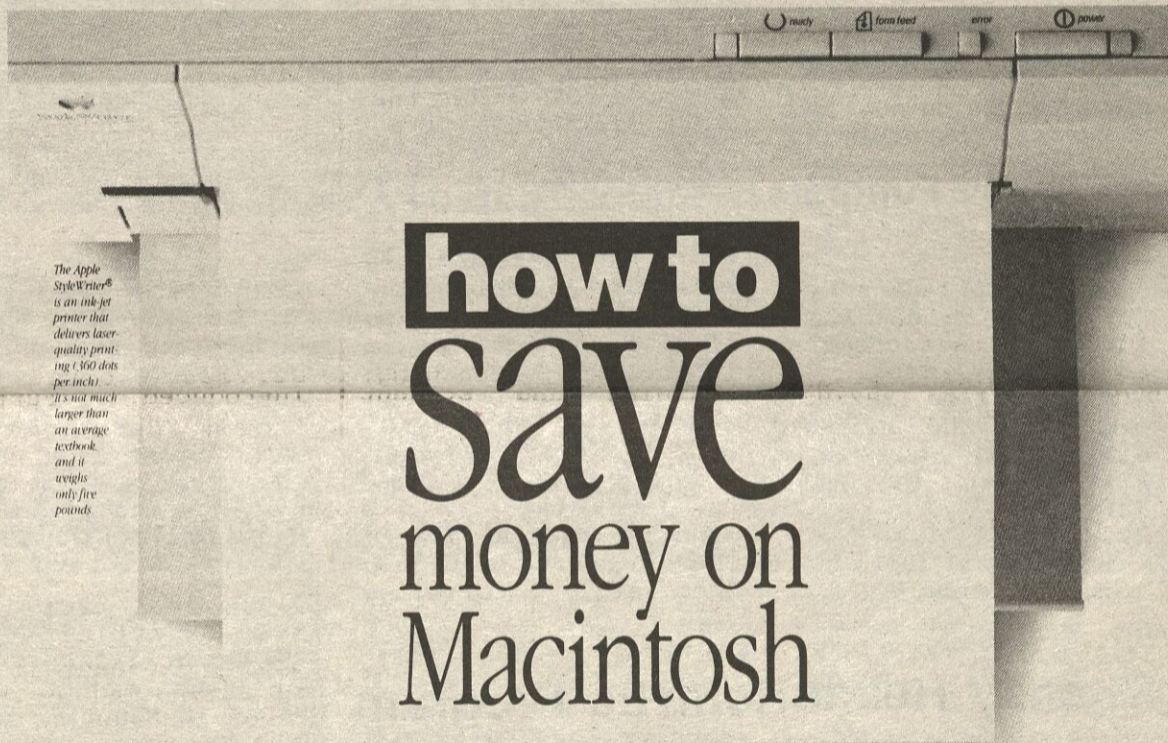
Tickets are \$7 for adults; \$6 for students and seniors. The money received from the box office goes to the Drama Department.

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





Chancellor Callahan would like to explore and develop entrepreneurial opportunity with contract education, grants, partnerships and foundations. She will be setting up a series of meetings to select our goals and methods of achieving them. She will be meeting with educators from local high schools and many other schools around the country in order to solicit a cohesive high school recruitment plan.

By the end of the year, student participation in all aspects of College operations will increase via the proposed student ambassador program, and there will be more student participation on existing committees.

There will be task groups for each of the colleges and work plans for the districtwide goals, chancellor's goals and the individual college goals. Callahan said "we have set up a system to have a specific work plan.

In addition, it was recently announced that the Federal Loan Program would be dropped from several colleges throughout California, as a result of the poor default rate of students who do not pay back the loans. Cañada College would appeal this finding.

After graduating from San Francisco State with a major in Home Economics, Chaney choose Cañada because of its "wonderful home ec department" which she says focuses on textiles and clothing.

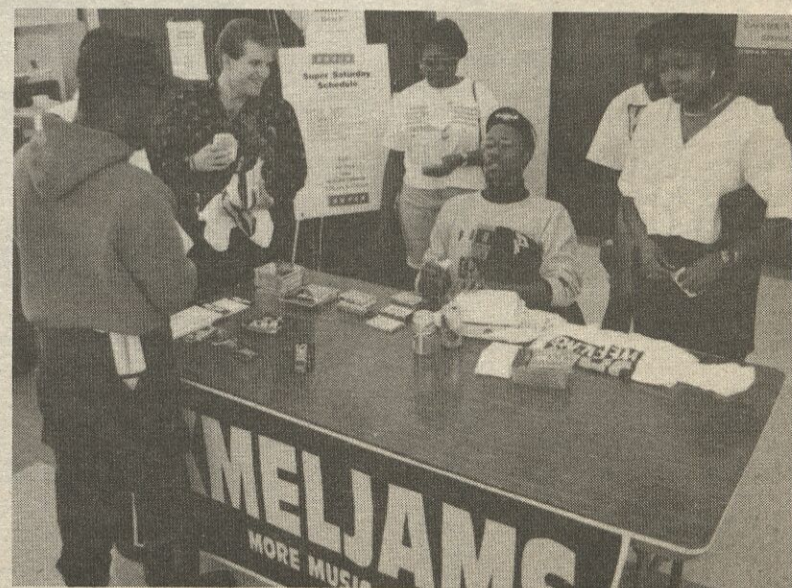
