**College of San Mateo: Buildings 5/6 Demolition**

CSM's Student Services Building 5/6 – the largest on campus at 73,588 square feet is now gone. Under the supervision of the General Contractor, McCarthy Builders, demolition began on July 7, 2008 and three weeks later all that was left were large piles of rubble. At the peak of activity, there were four large excavators (each fitted with a different type of claws, cruncher, or grabber), one mini-excavator to get into tight spots, three small front end loaders to move debris around, a recycling machine which sorted metals from regular construction debris (like drywall), and a concrete crusher. There were even "brooms" - which were large salvage steel beams - that the excavators used to push around debris and cleaned the road! Approximately 8,000 tons of concrete was crushed which will be re-incorporated into the new project as aggregate base

for roads. It's too early to know the tonnage of rebar that was salvaged, but the pile before off-haul began was well over 20 feet tall. The upper and lower reflecting pools and both of the colonnades that connected buildings 1 and 5 have also been demolished. New construction on the Design Build Project Building 5N, the "Occupational Health & Wellness Building" is scheduled to begin in October 2008.

**What is the Topping Off / Topping Out Tradition?** In building construction, topping out, or topping off, is a ceremony held when the last beam is placed at the top of a building. The term may also refer to the overall completion of the building’s structure. The practice of “topping out” a new building can be traced to the ancient Scandinavian religious practice of placing a tree on top of the new building to appease the tree-dwelling spirits of their ancestors that had been displaced. The practice migrated to England with Scandinavian invaders and took root there.

## New Work Order System.....Coming Soon!

In 2004, we implemented the Tamis Computerized Maintenance Management System (CMMS) to provide reactive work order and preventative maintenance planning, scheduling, tracking and processing. The preventative maintenance component has not proven adequate to the task of maintenance scheduling and work order processing. Since routine preventative maintenance is a major key to reducing long-term maintenance and operational costs, we decided to search for a replacement CMMS that would fully meet our needs in terms of both work order and preventative maintenance modules. A panel comprised of Facilities, Construction Planning Department, Information Technology Services, and General Services representatives reviewed written proposals from Maintenance Connection and TMA Systems, Inc. Maintenance Connection’s proposal best met the evaluation criteria of the selection process. Their proposed software and implementation costs were the lowest of the three finalists. Their software program’s user interface, ease of use, adaptability and overall functionality were judged the best by our panel. We are planning on starting implementation in September, with a scheduled completion in December 2008.
