Painting Churches, a play directed by Cañada's Mike Walsh, opened in the Flexible Theater Oct. 12 and will run Oct. 13, 14, 19, 20 and 21. All performances begin at 8 p.m.

Painting Churches is a richly humorous and deeply moving play about a daughter who is in the process of coming to term, with her aging parents and they with her. Mags, the daughter, is a rising artist who has returned home to help her aging parents pack to move from their family home. She hopes to paint a portrait of them and at the same time gain their respect and approval.

The play conveys the humor of the ec-

centric parents and the artistic daughter while exploring the sadness and triumph of this true to life situation. It is a warm and sensitive play.

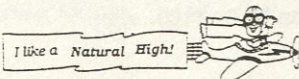

October's Meaningful Fashion Statement

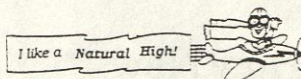
What's the hottest fashion trend the week of October 22-28?

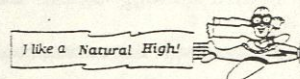

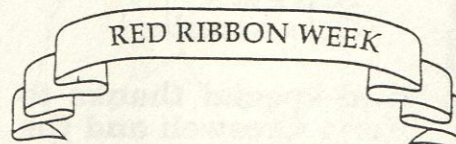
Cañada's activities wrap up on Wednesday from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. with a visit from representatives of the woodside women's

College Offers Classes in the Community

Cañada Opens New Adaptive P.E. Facility

A Joint Open House was held by Cañada college and Sequoia Hospital to celebrate their new exercise facility at the Veterans Senior Center on September 12.

The facilities were officially opened in a special ceremony. Redwood City Mayor Jack Greenalch, Cañada College President Robert Stiff and Sequoia Hospital's director of Pulmonary Services Dr. Bernard Votteri were present.

Sequoia offers an outpatient exercise program for graduates of the pulmonary and asthma rehab programs, while Cañada offers special exercise programs for the disabled and persons with special exercise needs.

Stationary bicycles and a variety of weights and cardiovascular equipment, especially designed for that program are features of the facility. The 49ers moved out of the two-story building nearly a year ago and headed south to a newer facility in Santa Clara. Redwood City, which owns the building, remodeled it into classrooms and exercise rooms for the Veterans Memorial Senior Center next door.

The Cañada College Fitness classes, now fill the spaces where the benches and cubbyholes once stood full of football equipment and 49er's belongings.

The equipment in the old locker room has been adapted for the physical limitations of the Cañada students. The seats of several old stationary bikes have been removed so they can be used by wheelchair-bound students. The pedals have been replaced with straps to hold their legs in place.

The students range in age from 18 to 88 and suffer from a variety of illnesses, including asthma, Parkinson's disease, cerebral palsy and multiple sclerosis.

The facilities are also used by the Sequoia hospital Pulmonary and Asthma Rehabilitation Program.

Cañada College Off Campus Classes

Space is still available for a variety of Cañada College off-campus classes held at the Veteran's Memorial Senior center and Fair Oaks Senior Center in Redwood City and Little House in Menlo Park.

Courses include "Beginning Conversational Spanish," "Indians of North America," "Historical Perspectives of International Events," "Reader's Theater," and a

special class in "Conservatorship, When to Avoid and When to Use." These classes will all take place at the Veteran's Memorial Senior Center at 1455 Madison Avenue in Redwood City.

Cañada will also hold an Adaptive Physical Fitness class for Seniors in the old San Francisco 49er locker room which has been converted to a classroom in the Veterans Memorial Senior Annex. A special opening ceremony was held September 12 to celebrate the occasion.

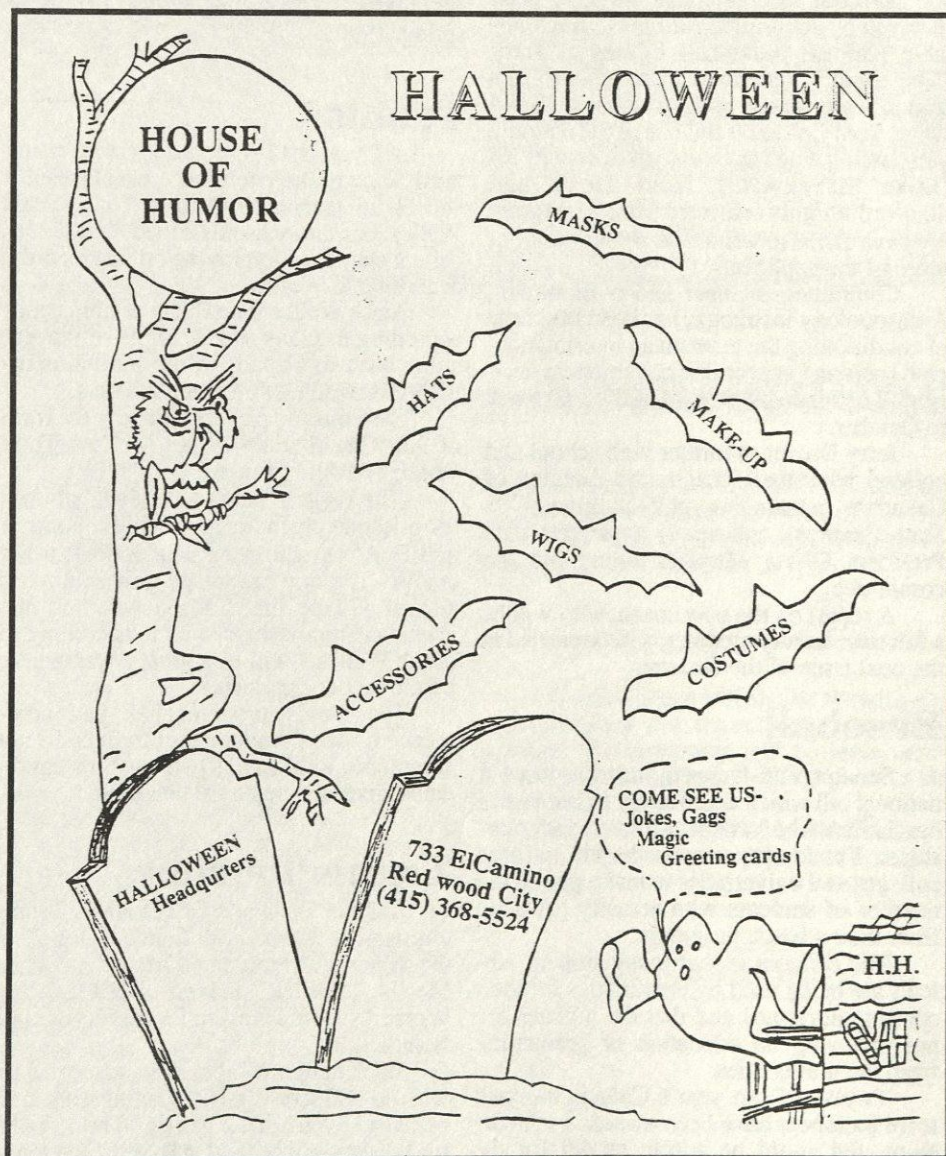
The Fair Oaks Senior Center will be the location for an eight week course on the "History of the American Musical" taught by Joe Marchi, director of the Cañada College Center for the American Musical. Marchi's course began September 28 and covers the history and development of America's musicals. Students will attend a special perform-

ance during the course which will be held from 6:30 to 9:55 p.m. on Tuesdays at the Fair Oaks Senior Center now located at 2600 Middlefield.

Classes at Menlo Park's Little House Senior Center will include "Spanish for Older Adults I," "Spanish for Older Adults II," "Historical Perspectives of International Events," and "Art History." All Classes will be held at Little House located at 800 Middle Avenue in Menlo Park.

Students receive one half unit credit for all Cañada off-campus classes at a cost of only \$2.50 for California residents.

Sports



New Basketball Coach

Cañada's basketball picture will come more sharply into focus in the early weeks of October when the selection committee will name one of the 13 finalists for the head coaching position left vacant by the sudden summer departure of its popular and successful director, Alan Klein. Klein left to accept a position as director of the Nampa, Idaho, high school basketball program. He was at Cañada three years, bringing to the Colts their first league championship in 1988 and qualifying for the California state playoffs all three years.

John Friesen, Cañada's Humanities Division Chairman and basketball committee selection Chair, will then announce the results of the arduous task of sifting through the numerous applicants.

Thirteen finalists were interviewed during the last week of September. Phone calls and personal recommendations have been received by committee members. Such notable national basketball figures as Jerry "The Shark" Tarkanian from UNLV, this season's pre-season national favorite, Boyd Grant from Colorado and one of the nation's outstanding defensive strategists, coach "K" (Mike Kryzewski) from Duke and Stanford's highly respected Mike Montgomery have called or written on behalf of one or more of the applicants.

Committee member Eldon Earnhardt, Anthropology instructor, has been in charge of conditioning the team on an interim, non-paid basis and expects the committee's decision to be made by the end of the first week in October.

Jerry Drever, a former high school and college basketball coach and director of Cañada's outstanding golf program ('88 State Champs), and newly appointed Vice President Olivia Martinez round out the committee.

A report on the new coach, who will be a full time faculty member, will be carried in the next issue of the *Gazette*.

Baseball

Senator Ted Kennedy has proposed a national bill which could apply to last year's baseballers who have been awarded scholarships. Kennedy has proposed a bill to force colleges and universities to make public the number of students who actually graduate from their athletic programs.

The concern is that many student athletes are being used by universities for their sporting attributes and that the athletes are not receiving an education or graduating from the universities.

Twelve of last year's Cañada baseball team members have been awarded scholarships and could be a role model for the

student/athlete graduation ratio.

The University of Nebraska has awarded scholarships to three Cañada players, Bobby Volk, Paul Fanucci and Kevin Jordan. Domingo Mota is at Cal State Fullerton, Mike Morland at the U. of Texas, George Keisel at Santa Clara U., Daryl Mitchell at Cal State Hayward, Tim Firth at Texas Tech, Bob Palacio at Illinois U., Paul Santos at College of Idaho, Art Miranda at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo and Ron Perkins at USF.

If Kennedy passes this bill, these 12 athletes could discover that their grades at college are being closely monitored.

As for this year's baseball team, Mike Garcia, Cañada's baseball coach, satiated that this year's team is "outstanding and it's been my best recruit in five years."

The main opposition to Cañada will be DeAnza and Mission Colleges, but coach Garcia is confident of repeating as league champions. The league season begins in spring, 1990.

Tennis

Last year's 12-4 record giving Cañada third place in the conference was labeled a successful season by Cañada Coach Peter Welles, but this season's squad "has an excellent chance of improving on that record," according to Welles.

Coach Welles stated "If everything goes according to plans and a couple of players come back to Cañada in the Spring as intended, Cañada will be tough to beat."

The Colts top players will be in the form of Jim Chamberlain, Brian McCoy, Todd Wiebe and Andy Loren.

The biggest threat to Cañada's hopes for a league championship will be Foothill and DeAnza, who consistently field strong teams. The one advantage going into this season will be that Cañada will host the league championships, which, according to coach Welles, "will be a great advantage to hold over our opponents."

The tennis program has just commenced, and although team tryouts do not commence until January, the team's candidates are practicing until that time.

Tennis Tourney

Cañada College's Fall Doubles Tennis tournament will be held Sunday, Oct. 22 at the college. The tourney is a non-sanctioned Men's doubles, Mixed Doubles and Women's Doubles event for players of class B ability.

Each match will be an 8 - game pro set with no-add scoring; The winning team must be ahead by at least 2 games. The 12 point tie-breaker will be used at 8 - all. First round

losers will play in a consolation tournament that will be run on the same day. Players may enter two events.

Entries close Wednesday, October 18, at 5:00. You will be notified by phone of your first match. In case of rain, the tournament will be completed the following week-end.

A default will be called if a team is not ready to play within 15 minutes of its scheduled starting time.

The entry fee is \$25.00 per team, and will be used to further the tennis program at Cañada College. Trophies will be awarded to winners and runners-up in each event in both championship and consolation draws.
