### Final Votes Cast Nov. 26

For the next two days Cañada College students will be casting their ballots in the first student body elections ever to be held on this campus.

Of the twenty-five elective offices in contention, all will be final when the votes are counted with the possible exception of Freshman Class President. If no candidate gets one more than one-half the votes cast, the last runner-up will be dropped from the ballot and a final election will be held on Nov. 26.

With more than two candidates and offices open in the judicial and rules committees, a plurality will determine the winner, rather than a majority

Voting procedures will be exactly the same as in the Constitution and Mascot elections. The polls will be located on the south side of Bldg. 17 and each voter must present a student body card before voting. The polls will be open at 8 and will close at 3, on the 19th and

Results of the election will be announced in this Friday's issue of The Cañada Newspaper.

#### Ted Aune **Endorsed!**

will be the first two names listed on tomorrow's ballot as contenders for the office of Cañada College's first Student Body President. Shannon is 22 years old, a veteran of the U.S. Navy, and a business management major in his first year of college. Aune is a 19 year old philosophy major in his sophomore year of college.

Ted Aune

Aune said that "giving a student an opportunity to voice an opinion and to see it acted upon, along with letting the students know and understand what their government is doing, and why, are the main reasons for my candidacy." Aune continued, saying, "the student government must work at establishing good student-faculty relations. The faculty and the students have many of the same problems and issues that effect both groups in the same way. Through a meaningful relationship, I feel we can do much to solve these problems for the benefit of all." As student body president, Shannon hopes and expects "to create a warm and friendly relationship between students, faculty, and administration. "Cañada College is brand new and is not bound by any precedents." Nothing is working against us. I would push any programs or activities which would stimulate openmindedness, thought, and reflection among students.3

Commenting on the College Readiness Program which will get under way next semester, Shannon believes it is a good and necessary program but funds and student progress should Shannon said, "there is enough money to take care of both The

Readiness Program and sports here at Cañada, rather than sending sports to CSM and the Readiness Program to the Cañada Campus.'

Aune states, "the College Readiness Program is basically good, but it should be more efficiently organized and more strictly administered to insure it accomplishing it aims. The program must be open to anyone, regardless to color. The determining criteria is 'true need' for the assistance the Program offers." Aune is currently working for the establishment of a Readiness program at Cañada

Just as he feels there should be a Readiness Program at both Cañada and CSM, Aune believes that both schools should have a full sports program.

Shannon favors the idea of the Experimental College if enough student interest is displayed and also hopes to initiate a student store program where general items not sold in the bookstore could be bought. "The profit from this student operated store will go toward cutting the bookstore's margin, which in turn, will lower the prices of school books and supplies.'

Aune plans opinion polls, Experimental College, tutoring seminars and primarily "fund raising projects to get money to support and supplement student activities." As for clubs on campus, Aune states, "any clubs and organizations forming on campus must be open and accessable to all students. This is the only way to promote understanding among our students for each other."

Both Aune and Shannon are basing their plans for the ASOC government on student participation and involvement.

My reason for running for this office is to create a student government that will be responsive to all of the Cañada Community. I would like to start a comprehensive intermural program.


