## Jane Fonda Draws Record Cañada Crowd



The largest crowd ever assembled on the Canada campus gathered to hear actress anti-war activist Jane Fonda speak in the outer west parking lot at Tuesday's rally. Speaking from the back of a flat bed truck she charged, "This college doesn't want you to know the truth, which is why we are out here" in the parking lot.

Dean of students Bob Fryckman estimated the crowd to be around 1100 strong. However Vietnam Veteran and rally organizer, Frank Milatzo believes the crowd exceeded 2500. Ms. Fonda opened her speech saying "If you live in a country whose people are not used to hearing the truth, you expect a university to move you away from the main campus."

The first speaker to appear was Tom Hayden, Chicago eight

defendant and Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) organizer. Hayden's appearance preceded his departure for Hanoi where he will remain until Nov. 13 arranging for the release of some POWs. In a speech describing U.S. war crimes in Indo China he remarked, "Our ideas are so threatening that we are moved to the dirt roads on the outside of universities."

The administration feared security could not be effectively maintained any where other than the parking lot. This included the quad area between the Fine Arts and Administration buildings where last year's Spring festival was held. According to administrative assistant John Rhoads, neither the gym nor the auditorium could accommodate such a large crowd.

The youthful looking activist labeled the impending peace agreement between North Vietnam and the allies as the "Greatest hoax in the history of hoaxes" staged for the purpose of deceiving voters. He said diplomacy, as conducted by

Henry Kissinger is "something middle age men carry out behind closed doors in behalf of the very many by the very few." Hayden then asked "Why is this man carrying out decisions behind our backs?" He then added, "We find out later we have been swindled."

As the organizer spoke, Ms. Fonda was seated on the ground listening intently to Hayden. She assessed the student anti-war movement as presently being "sewn with confusion from the lies perpetuated by the Nixon administration." To overcome this confusion she said "We have to work to get the word out."

Toward the end of Hayden's speech, he predicted there will be no peace agreement made before the 1972 elections. He reported the Nixon administration has been responsible for dropping a record number of bombs over four million tons which is twice as much as our WWII bombings. Among the war atrocities Hayden cited was the

## Who Cares?

Apathy, according to the World Book Encyclopedia Dictionary, is the "Lack of interest or desire for activity." What better portrays the feeling of apathy in the County of San Mateo than the fact that only 100 people came to the Political Awareness Day, offered by the Associated Students of the College of San Mateo.

Here the people were given a chance to hear and question many of the candidates running for positions that could affect them directly. Why didn't they come? Was it for lack of advertising? No. Was it for lack of presence of viable candidates? Certainly not. Was it for lack of sufficient time for the constituents to prepare for the day? No, they could have heard as early as one month ahead of time that candidates were going to talk. Basically the reason people didn't come is the lack of interest or desire for activity. Apathy.

In this year of political decision, it would be difficult for anyone to have already made up their minds on all the issues. Why didn't they come to ask questions? Because it's easier to cast a vote without knowing what you are doing. What the hell. It's only one vote. Right? Wrong, the voters of San Mateo County could very well decide the fate of many of the 22 State Propositions as well as the Presidential candidate to receive California's electoral votes.

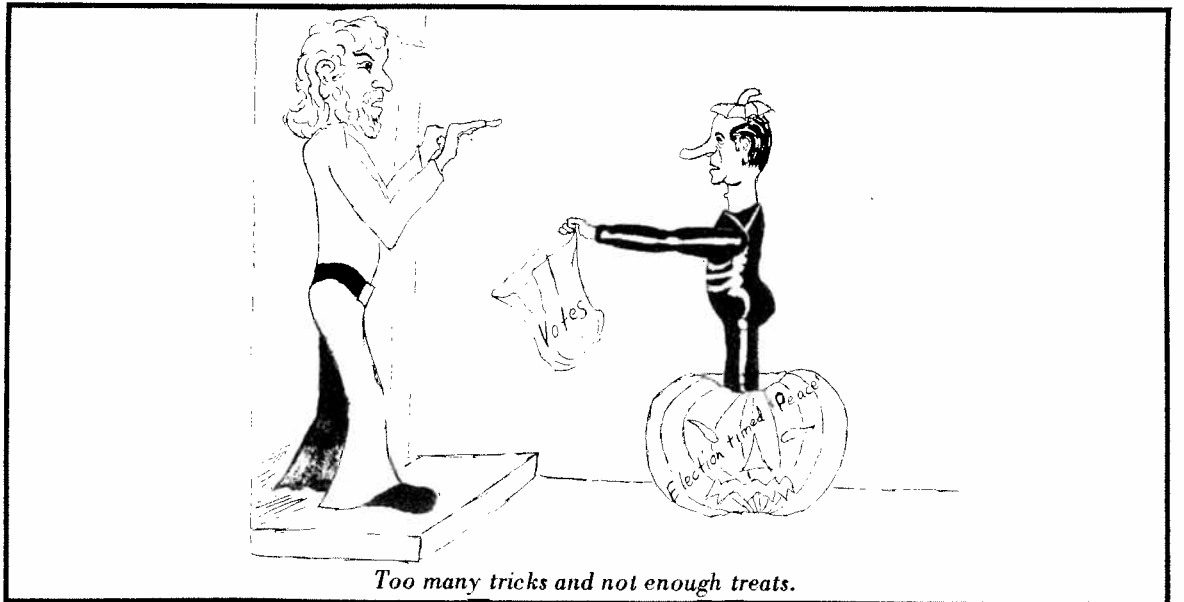
There are true choices this year, regarding which direction the people wish the government to move. Nixon vs. McGovern is a well publicized race, where distinctions of the candidates are made obvious. But how about the 11th Congressional District. There is a choice of liberal Democrat (Leo Ryan) vs. conservative Republican (Charles Chase). Or the 26th Assembly District? There is a choice of a politically moderate Republican (Arnett) vs. an 18 year-old Democrat (Beth Labson). Or the Central District for the Municipal Court? You have a choice between a conservative incumbent (Marcel Biscay) or a liberal challenger (Edward Pliska). If you've made your mind up on all these candidates, how about the propositions? Can you give a logical reason for each of your votes? Or are you voting as one of your friends suggested? Let's examine the significance of just three of the propositions. Number 11 if passed would include in the inalienable rights of the citizens of California, the right to privacy. Think for a minute of the Orwellian affect the defeat of 11 would have. The people would in affect be saying to the government that they didn't want privacy and it would be fine for the State to pry into the private business of the citizenry.

Proposition 17 would attempt to overrule a Supreme Court decision that eliminated the death penalty from the list of possible punishments for the criminally convicted. What happens if this passes? Is it legal for the populous to alter the opinion of the Supreme Court? Can you answer these and other questions about the Death Penalty Initiative?

State Proposition 22, the Agricultural Labor Relations Initiative proposes an end to the boycott as a legal form of dissent for the farm-worker. It could prevent a strike for better wages. Yet, with these very definite objectives of the initiative, how can both sides be using the same slogan, "Justice for farm-workers"?

It is necessary for every citizen who plans to vote, to scrutinize the arguments proposed by people who support or oppose anything. If you are a thinking human being, you should be aware that when someone wants something he might lie to get it. Read the propositions, and in the future go out and listen to the candidates.

Are you willing to cast an intelligent vote? For the sake of the future of America, let's hope so.



## New Freshman Pres. Wants 'Togetherness'

Arthur Martin has recently been elected as Cañada's freshman class president. Although new here, he seems genuinely concerned about the campus and its functions.

Martin says that his main objective as frosh president is to represent the students. Although he has many ideas of his own, Martin believes that the concerns of the students should be of top priority over his own personal concerns.

When asked about his plans for

Cañada, Martin expressed a need for togetherness on campus. He stated:

"This college could prosper as a unit, instead of a few groups. Everybody should be concerned about everyone else. I feel that an elected officer should generate love and concern and my first step as president is to show this concern."

As a graduate of Sequoia High School, Martin describes Cañada as a "relaxed place with little pressure." Martin has been active

in student government at Sequoia.

One of his immediate concerns as president is the evaluating of teachers at Cañada.

"The teachers could be helped by this evaluation," Martin explained. "They could find out what their weaknesses are. We could run the forms off on the computer here at Cañada." Martin added that the evaluation should be done before the end of the semester, to avoid any hard feelings that a student may have, concerning a given grade.

## Sears Abused By Authorities

A bummer, a bust, a trip to jail, and a consequent stay at Napa State Mental Hospital were the unfortunate incidents of the past month for former student body president Peter Sears. But the overriding theme of Sears' brush with the authorities was the manner in which he was treated by the Redwood Sheriff's department during and after his arrest. Sears charged that the department had been unnecessarily brutal and abusive.

The incident started when Sears downed a full tab of Blue Krishna, a powerful type of LSD. He got off on a bum trip which culminated in Sears' striking Dean of Men, Robert Fryckman across the face.

Still on the bummer, Sears was arrested on charges of assault & battery, and disturbing the peace. He was taken to Redwood City Jail. It was here that Sears underwent what he said were "Perfect examples of police brutality" at the hands of his jailers.

The 31-year old Sears related

that during his brief stay in jail, several rights guaranteed by the constitution were withheld. First, he was not read his rights of legal counsel, of silence, etc. Second, he was not informed of the charges being brought against him. Third, he was not offered a telephone call.

Also during his stint in jail, Sears said that twice, when his back was turned, the cell in which he was held was bombarded with tear gas. Both times, his assailant left before Sears could get a look at him. Of these incidents, Sears said, "I have considered pressing charges against the Sheriff's department for the way in which I was treated. So far, however, I have taken no action. When you have a charge against a sheriff's department, it's hard to make it stick, no matter how valid it is."

After an interview with a psychologist Sears was presented with a choice as to his immediate fate; he could remain in Redwood City and face the charges against him, or he could take a trip to Napa. Although he wanted to

remain in Redwood City, Sears was transported to the State Mental Hospital, Napa.

The hour's drive to Napa was no more pleasant than jail had been. Sears told that during the trip he was threatened with bodily harm by the two transportation officers who formed his escort. "At one point," Sears said, "They threatened to take me out on the Bay and shoot me." (When contacted, the Redwood City Sheriff's Department said they "Were not at liberty" to release the names of the officers who transported Sears.)

Upon arrival at Napa, Sears asked to file a written complaint against the two officers who had threatened him. His request was denied by the admitting psychiatrist. Sears was then escorted to an isolation cell, where he was held for several hours.

Later, he was transferred to a maximum security ward for the initial three-day observation period. During the seventy-two (Continued on Page 4)

## Health Food Advocate To Speak At Canada

Adelle Davis, the renowned nutritionist who recently locked horns with the Federal Drug Administration, is coming to Cañada to lecture in the Main Theater Nov. 10, 8 p.m.

A crusader in the relatively young science of nutrition, Mrs. Davis has attracted a legion of fans, plus some powerful enemies. Members of the Food and Drug Administration in Washington D.C. leveled strong charges against her for her views on chemical additives in food.

Mrs. Davis contends that many of the thousands of additives now legally added to food are harmful to humans. In her book, "Let's Cook It Right" she asserts, "Any individual or group which raises a voice against them (chemical additives) is quickly declared a 'faddist' spreading 'scare' propaganda. Yet if we view the situation with apathy, we may well be producing cancer in our children, our husbands, our friends, and ourselves in the same way that it is produced in experimental animals."

The ebullient Adelle has spent more than 25 years telling Americans how to keep healthy by eating right. Four books, hundreds of television appearances and innumerable lectures have all revolved around one theme ... you are what you eat.

practice of shoving glass bottles up the vaginas of women prisoners and cases of electronic devices being attached to male genitals during interrogations.

A guerrilla theater was staged after Hayden's speech which portrayed the "saving" of an Indo-Chinese village by American forces from the communists. A small private plane swooped near the scene in a mock raid as the players pretended to be struck down. Young men dressed in military fatigues then moved in to "finish off" the injured victims with toy M-16 rifles.

It was later learned that the pilot of the plane was cited for breaking Federal Aviation Administration regulations of "buzzing a populated area" and "performing unapproved aerobatics." FAA officials and sheriff deputies were at San Carlos airport when the plane landed. Rhoads took pictures of the alleged maneuvers to be used in a forthcoming FAA hearing where the fate of the pilot will be determined.

Former student body president Peter Sears, who was a passenger in

In her most popular book, "Let's Eat Right To Keep Fit," she has written, "Your nutrition can determine how you look, act and feel; whether you are grouchy or cheerful, homely or beautiful, physiologically and psychologically young or old; whether you think clearly or are confused, enjoy your work or make it a drudgery."

The vegetarian diet is of particular concern to the nutrition expert. Though she has known many vegetarians she has known only a few who have maintained their health year after year. "Unless a vegetarian is trained in nutrition," she says, "he usually becomes an unhealthy vegetarian." When meat and animal products are excluded from the diet getting adequate protein becomes a very serious problem that few untrained people can handle.

Mrs. Davis is the mother of two children and is a consulting nutritionist in Los Angeles. She studied at Purdue, Columbia, University of California, and U.C.L.A., and has a Master's Degree from the University of Southern California Medical School. Early in her career she served as a hospital dietitian and as public school Supervisor of Health Education.

the plane said the aircraft never actually went over the crowd, but rather over the fields below the hillside beyond the area where the rally was held. "The movement got a hold of me", he then added "I've been straight ever since." Ms. Fonda then warned that the American people better bring Vietnam into their lives before "Nixon eliminates it from our minds," as she put it. She also added "Unless we recognize what is happening we are doomed, (and) 1984 will be here ahead of schedule."

Commenting after the speech, Rhoads said "She would have a hard time verifying her charges" and he added "It just wasn't that factual."

Despite the record attendance, there seemed to be an underrepresentation of faculty members and from the administration. Less than nine of the 125 faculty members were present, and only four administrators were on hand. "What are they afraid of?" asked former Stanford professor Bruce Franklin in a speech referring to those who feel such rallies are dangerous.

The basic format for the day was each speaker was to give a five minute presentation followed by a five minute question and answer period. The first group of speakers

were running for the seat in the 11th Congressional District. Leo J. Ryan and Charles E. Chase, the two candidates with the best chance of winning the race in the newly formed 11th District spoke to the issues in their five minutes, and both said they would not support Proposition 19 (the marijuana initiative) on the November ballot. When questioned as to why they wouldn't support the

decriminalization of marijuana Ryan said, "We must stop treating marijuana users as criminals, but Proposition 19 goes too far," and Chase said, "First time offenders of the marijuana laws are not being sentenced now anyway, why make it any easier (for

people) to use just another drug in our society." The third candidate for the office, Nicholas W. Kudrovzeff, of the American Independent Party, addressed himself, more to himself and what he would do, as he said "If ... elected to Congress I'm not going back there (to Washington D.C.) to fight the rules of the game, until I can see what it's all about. (I would be a representative) ... from San Mateo County and try to co-operate with everyone."

Then came McCloskey and James Stewart who are battling for the seat in the newly formed 17th Congressional District. This is a classic liberal Republican vs. liberal Democrat race. Both candidates pledge to support the President of the United States. Both candidates want social reforms. Both candidates want an end to the war in Vietnam, and both candidates want to represent the people from their district.

Some dozen and a half candidates or representatives later, this reporter finally got a chance to look at the facility CSM had set up for the "Day." It was really quite sufficient. There were tables for each of the candidates, and for people representing both sides

each of the 22 state propositions. Not all the tables were used, which is just another sign of the trend toward voter apathy.

Josh Cooney, candidate of the American Independent Party for the 26th Assembly District summed up the question of apathy when he said, "The Democratic Party is going to turn around, and as George Wallace said 'I (Wallace) will make it a party where the common folks will be welcome in its ranks,' and when that happens the people of this great land will not be afraid any longer to support the issues and candidates openly."

## Morton Quits Kennel Project; Sees Conflict in New Policy

Cañada student, Rick Morton, who's headed up the dog kennel project here since last fall resigned Friday. His resignation was due to the new campus dog policy installed by President James Duke, which went into effect Sept. 18. The conflict lies within rule one of the new policy, which is contradictory in content.

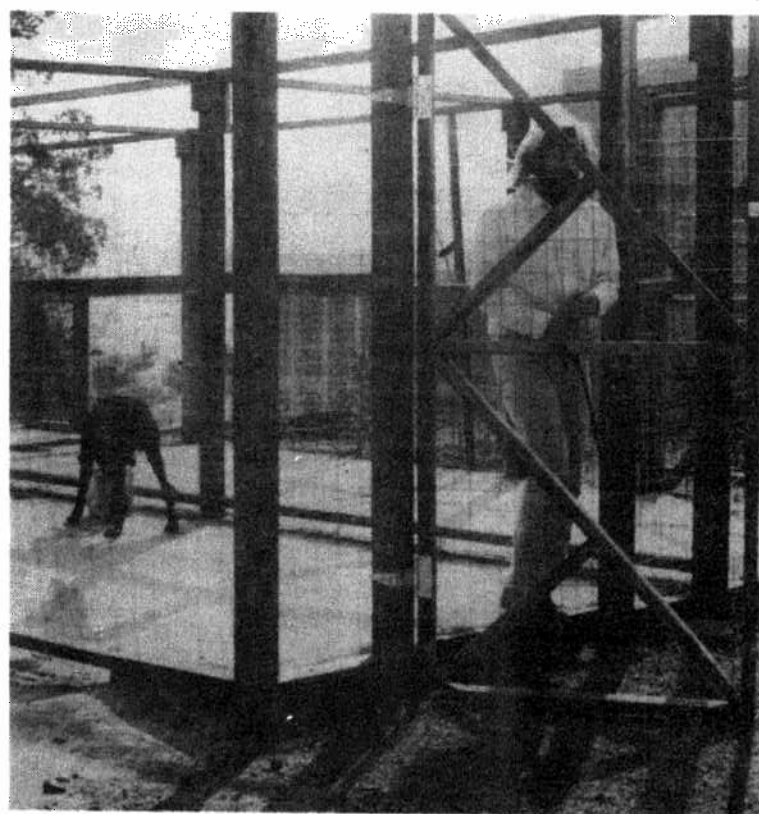
The main reasons for the new ruling were stated by Duke as being students fear of dogs, several dog bite cases, and a few complaints written and phoned in by the students. Duke stated that "the purpose of this college is instruction and that even though there haven't been that many complaints there have been enough to warrant the new policy." Beyond these reasons is the fact that the college district is now being sued by a man who was knocked down by a dog at Skyline College.

The whole purpose of the dog kennel is that it would, with the co-operation of the students, be able to handle the dog situation adequately without written rules dominating the process. Duke's premise is that last year was given to the students to work this matter out and it wasn't successful. The dog kennel was still under construction last year and operations and enforcement of dog patrolling was newly devised and unorganized. This type of project needs time to get its feet off the ground and all the help and co-operation it can get from fellow students as well as the administration. Morton noted the participation of the students was positive except for a few that felt that their wants were more important.

Morton's proposal would enable two people to enforce dog control at Cañada and get paid. Morton said, "the job is full time and there just isn't anyone that has that much time to volunteer." The jobs could have been used for work study students therefore

helping the students and the administration at the same time. Morton stated, "I felt that I was helping the school out with this project by eliminating the involvement of the sheriff. It's much better to deal with another student than it is to be fined by the sheriff. The job consisted of enforcing the rules. The first rule

responsible person yet not be allowed to enter any school building. He feels this is really picking bones and asked for the ruling to be reconsidered by Duke. Morton feels that he can't enforce a rule that says all dogs must be on a leash at all times and under direct control of a

discourages the students from bringing their dogs onto the campus," is how Duke answered the question of the contradictory nature of the rule. So as it stands no one is patrolling the dogs on campus which could lead to many dogs being taken to the S.P.C.A. by the sheriff if they are caught and a lot of inconveniences for the dog owners of Cañada. If anyone is missing a dog, Morton suggests you check with the S.P.C.A., they just might have it.

# Colts Seek Fourth Crown Tomorrow

Canada's soccer team won the Northern California soccer championship Tuesday, defeating Diablo Valley 3-1. If the Colts beat last place Alameda tomorrow it will mark the fourth time in as many years Canada has taken the league title.

The Colts jumped to a 3-0 first half lead against Diablo Valley and the game was never in doubt. Ken Zylker, Eric Grantz, and Ron Watson scored the Canada goals. Watson's goal was an unbelievable shot. Grantz was cited by coach Vial as playing by far his best game of the year. Other standouts included Fred Cesano, Harold Whitmore, Bob Koch, and Zylker. The colts fired 33 shots at the

Diablo Valley goal while limiting the enemy to a mere seven tries at the Canada goal. The victory ran the teams record to 8-0-2 in league and 10-0-2 overall. The high scoring Colts have out scored their opponents 54-9.

Coach Vial considers this years squad, "The best overall team skill wise I've ever coached." This years team doesn't have the great individual scorers of the past (Zylker and Raphael Luna), but defensively they are the best Canada has ever had.

The Colts have three super players in team captain Whitmore, Watson, and all-American Koch. All of them made all-League last

year, and by their performances this season seemed destined to repeat.

Freshman Grantz has the potential to be a great player and Tony Asborno, Joe Pronk, Rich Monzi, and Sal Gallio have the ability to become good soccer players. coach Vial feels "Eddie Avakian needs only experience to come into his own." Avakian has the best ball control and touch on the team and needs to correct a few bad habits to be good.

The Colts host the semi finals of the Shaunessy playoffs Thursday November 8th, playing either Skyline or Ohlone. However, tomorrow's game against Alameda can not be taken lightly.

Coach Vial is well aware of the possibility of a letdown and maintains that, "On any given day any team can win." Having come this far it is very doubtful that the Colts will overlook Alameda.

The Colts have a definite advantage entering the playoffs. By winning the Norcal championship the Colts picked up a valuable point and must therefore be beaten twice in the playoffs. Another advantage is the schedule that has West Valley and DeAnza playing back to back games with the winner meeting Canada for all the marbles.

Game time is 3 p.m. tomorrow at Alameda.

# Big Year Ahead For Golden State Warriors

This could be the year the Golden State Warriors will win it all in the NBA. The return of Rick Barry, Cazzie Russell's brilliant play of late, and the awesome play of Nate Thurmond at both ends of the court might be enough to produce an NBA championship in California for the second straight year.

The Warriors impressive 28

point victory over the defending NBA champion Los Angeles Lakers last Friday, left no doubt about the Golden Staters' title chances. Cazzie Russell and Jeff Mullins combined for 54 points and Nate Thurmond led a tough defense that held the high scoring Lakers to 91 points. Rick Barry who is slowly rounding into form chipped in with 17.

Saturday night's 122-107 victory over the Atlanta Hawks was never in doubt. The Warriors jumped off to a quick 14-4 advantage and held it through the entire game. Cazzie Russell led all scorers with 34 points and had some fine assists to Barry and Thurmond. Russell and Barry compliment each other very well for having played together so little.

Thurmond played an outstanding game both ways. He gave Hawk centers Walt Bellamy and Bob Christian fits at both ends of the court. He held both to a combined total of one point in the first half, while scoring 18 and grabbing 12 rebounds.

Russell was just as impressive

with a fine display of outside shooting and passing. He has always been able to shoot and the improvement in his passing makes him a more complete ball player. Teamed with Barry at forward gives him more open shots and takes some of the scoring pressure off Barry and Thurmond.

The Warriors return to action Saturday nite hosting the tough New York Knicks. This game will produce some good match ups. Barry will probably work against Dave Debussere, Russell will more than likely be teamed against ex-teammate Bill Bradley, and Thurmond will oppose Willis Reed if Reed is healthy. All Warrior home games start at 8 p.m. and are played at the Oakland Coliseum.

hour hold, he underwent intensive psychological testing. It was decided after three days to hold Sears for further testing, for up to 14 additional days. It was only nine days later, however, that authorities had satisfied themselves as to Sears' sanity; he was told he could leave five days before the two-week period.

The Redwood City Sheriff's department was notified of Sears early release, and Napa officials asked the department to escort Sears back to Redwood City "At their earliest possible convenience." The Sheriff's department said that their earliest convenience would be five days hence, which meant that Sears would have to stay at Napa five days past the time he was eligible to leave.

Fortunately for Sears, however, he was released to friends who had been visiting.

When released, Sears was allowed to return to campus and

resume classes. His return was not unconditional, however. Soon after returning, he was told by Dean of Men Robert Fryckman that he was forbidden to hold any "post of leadership" in student government for the rest of the semester. Also, he has been ordered to seek therapy with a county psychiatrist or psychologist.

These orders have been willingly accepted by Sears, who added that he might actually benefit from the conditions. "Because I'm just a student now, I don't have to hassle with the responsibilities and demands of being the student body president," he told THE NEWSPAPER this week. "I'm a lot calmer and more relaxed now."

"Also, I think therapy might do me some good, if I can find a good doctor." About the drug trip which triggered the incident, Sears said, "I'll probably never take that kind of acid again. Once is enough."

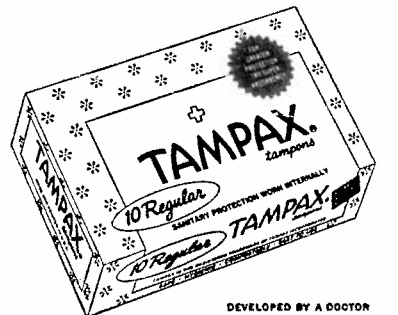
