Erik Gaspar presented on the above items. Erik commented on the mode of delivery revision taking place out of an abundance of caution due to the climate of the pandemic. Erik shared that more courses will be put forward to Curriculum Committee related to aquatics in the future. Nick C. added that in KAD, the division is in the process of deciding to make courses web assisted. Nick shared that they will ensure a proper canvas presence to address student needs. Lisa asked if students will be able to participate in KAD courses from home. Nick added that the campus is being mindful of CDC guidelines in terms of student and community safety. Nick shared that the goal is to help students use physical activity on a daily basis to maintain health, and he hopes that the flexibility in course offerings may assist students in achieving this goal. Gloria asked if the general public will be able to use the new building now that indoor exercise is possible due to CDC guidelines. Erik shared that there is still discussion inclusive of the third party vendor that is taking place. Erik shared that Matt Lee would be in discussions regarding these items at the district level. José added that this is the first meeting where we are returning to handbook guidelines regarding DE addendums being included on the substantive agenda and this is why Erik had to come present. José added that at the beginning of the semester, the consent agenda was utilized due to the state's emergency guidelines, but moving forward they will be included on the substantive agenda. Erik added that while KAD is awaiting the board decisions regarding the third party vendor, KAD still must consider staffing the space appropriately, and more conversations will be had throughout campus regarding this and Erik encouraged campus engagement in the process. Erik also added that in house, the student access plan is also being considered as a large population of student access the facility as KAD students but also as community members. A tiered program that has been vetted within the department has been created and a presentation is being made to administration to discuss access as related to student needs.

She shared that this is a 2 credit course developed with the idea that support for students was provided because of AB-705, but at the time, the campus was unsure of the exact requirements. In anticipation of the requirements, the department decided to have a support course ready and once the guidelines for AB-705 came, the lowest level of class that support can be provided does not include this course. Therefore, the course was not offered and it is not planning on being offered in the near future unless things change. Rather than delete and start again, the decision was made to bank the course for now.

Mahoney, Susan

• **IDST 150 - Honors Research Seminar (1.00)** (New Course)

Susan Mahoney presented on behalf of this item. Susan added that this course is not being brought from a particular department, but rather, due to the needs of faculty from a wide variety of departments, this is an interdisciplinary studies course, honors research seminar. It is designed to help mentor students through the academic research process. Susan shared that it is the hope that this will help take some of the mentoring duties from faculty members in students' specific disciplines. By creating this research seminar, community within the honors program is being proposed as students can help each other on their research projects, in addition to providing some scaffolding and mentoring as students pursue their research. CSM and Skyline have a similar interdisciplinary studies course offered at 2 units, while this course is being offered at 1. José added that three years ago, and again about a year ago, it was discussed at length regarding how to staff courses when it includes more than one subject and making sure that faculty meet minimum qualifications. José shared that this course's content is purely research, and the Tech Review Committee was able to make an exception and allow the course to take place, yet, we need to ensure that the minimum qualifications that are stated in the state's minimum qualifications are met when faculty teach the course. José added that the minimum qualifications are a Master's degree in the interdisciplinary area or a Master's degree in one of the discipline included in the interdisciplinary area and upper division or graduate course work in at least one other constituent discipline. If these type of courses arise in the future, the Tech Review Committee will have to review and make the decision. Susan added that it was considered to offer the course in a different discipline, but after much research, this seemed to be the best fit. Danielle shared that she thinks this is a great idea as someone who has worked with honors students, mentoring does take much time, and while she enjoyed it, it is wonderful to have an additional form of support for students. Lisa added that this will help create a sense of community for the students. Gloria asked if this will be a requirement for students taking honors courses. Susan clarified that it will not be a requirement, but it will be highly encouraged. Students need 15 units of honors to complete the program, and with this course, three one unit honors courses would exist. Students can take one three unit course each semester and then the other three one unit courses to fulfil the requirement. José asked if this course also applied to students who take dual CRN courses. Susan shared that it will be most valuable for students taking honors contract courses as these students are completing a research project as their contract, but for

students in a dual CRN course, the honors component is written directly into the course outline and it has varying degrees of research.

José presented on the above items. He shared that these items are part of his portion of the articulation report and that the courses need to be approved as part of the substantive agenda. The change that was made as a result of the deletion of the basic competency for ethnic studies affected several courses. When something like this happens, the Curriculum Committee takes action on those courses in order to help faculty expedite the process. In this case, the competency was deleted from each of 25 courses. Some had already been approved in previous meetings this year, so instead of activating them and re-submitting proposals, José deleted the competency. The courses on the substantive agenda on top are the ones that have not yet been approved, and this is why there are two different sections noted. The only change to the courses at the beginning is the deletion of the competency. The second section of previously approved courses is the deletion of the competency. This is effective fall 2021 for all courses. Gloria asked about students who have catalog rights using old degree patterns, and confirmed that their classes would still fulfil the competency as these changed are effective fall 2021. Soraya asked for clarification regarding catalog rights. Lisa clarified that even though the course students taking currently has been modified to remove the ethnic studies component, because they are using a previous catalog, they are ok. Soraya asked what happens if a student with old catalog rights takes the course after fall 2021. Madeline added that in degree works, students will be able to look at the catalog years and depending on the catalog year they select, the notation would either appear or not. Maria added if perhaps Soraya is wondering if a notation will be included that explains this major change to students, and how will students know. Maria added that students will be working with counselors, but Soraya may be considering those students who are not working with a counselor.

Soraya added that she is comparing this change to assist.org's presentation. José clarified that two different things are being discussed-basic competency for the campus versus articulation agreements from the state. Anything that is CSU-GE or IGETC is approved by the state and coded in banner with a starting and ending term. Basic competencies do not get coded, and get added to DegreeWorks and this is why there are not to be issues with students taking these classes and being able to use them retroactively. José asked if a student has a program of study and they run their program in DegreeWorks, the ethnic studies requirement portion will be visible and, a special note may not be needed because of this. Soraya added that a notation for the new catalog is likely not needed.

a. Chair's Report

Lisa shared that work is continuing and she did send out an SOS email to all deans based on the list that José provided at the previous meeting regarding courses that needed to be reviewed on the program review cycle. If this includes a DE addendum, this will now have to go on the substantive agenda as opposed to the consent agenda.

Lisa also shared that the meeting of March 26 has been cancelled because there were only a few courses on the agenda, and they can be moved to the following meeting.

b. Articulation Officer's Report (Gloria Darafshi, José Peña & Soraya Sohrabi)

Gloria shared the following articulation report with the committee:

Articulation Report March 12, 2021

Region 3 CIAC meeting (CA Intersegmental Articulation Council)

- UC Davis is conducting a complete re-evaluation of their articulation agreements because some agreements are many years old.
- UCOP staff is finishing up their review of courses submitted for IGETC General Education; it may be another 3-4 weeks before we see the results of the review.
- UC faculty are standing firm on accepting online labs. Their policy is that if the Course Outline doesn't change, but the modality does, it is no problem.
- SFSU Articulation Rep. announced that they are accepting lower-division transfers (less than 60 transfer units); students need to have their English Composition and Transfer Math completed; also completion of high school A-G requirements and a 2.5 HS GPA.
- SFSU will not be 100% on campus in the Fall lab classes, Senior Capstone projects, etc. will be prioritized for on-campus.
- Impacted majors at SFSU: Accounting concentration under Bus Admin; Nursing; Psychology; Social Work; Exercise & Movement concentration under Kinesiology.

 A Statewide faculty group "Ethnic Studies discipline Input Group" is meeting to develop an Ethnic Studies Associate Degree for Transfer. One does not now exist – closest ADT is Social Justice Studies.

Ethnic Studies 2021-2022 catalog changes

Gloria spoke about the changes made to the worksheets to make them effective in the upcoming catalog and Soraya spoke about the various changes that are being made in the catalog in order to remove the ethnic studies competency.

Gloria discussed the original CSU General Education Requirements 2020-2021 Worksheet (first image) and compared it with the final CSU General Education Requirements 2021-2022 Worksheet (second image), with changes made in red:

A. Resident Requirement

A minimum of 12 units must be completed in residence at Cañada College.

B. Scholarship Requirement

A 2.0 grade point average is required for all degree applicable coursework taken within the San Mateo County Community College District, and all incoming degree applicable coursework taken outside the District.

C. Major Requirement

A minimum of 18 units in a discipline or related disciplines as specified by the appropriate division. A grade point average of 2.0 in the major is required. All classes applied to the major (core and selectives) must receive a grade of "C" or better. If the course is evaluated by Pass or No Pass ONLY then a "Pass" evaluation for the course is acceptable. If the course is offered as "grade option" a letter grade of "C" or better is required. For additional information on the use of Pass/No Pass classes to satisfy degree requirements, please refer to the Pass/No Pass Grading Option information found in the Grades and Academic Standards section of the catalog. Either 12 units or fifty percent of the units required for the major, whichever is fewer, must be completed at Cañada College.

D. Basic Competency Requirements

Competency requirements exist for the areas of English (Reading and Writing), and Mathematics. Students must demonstrate competency according to the following in each of the areas in order to be eligible for the A.A. or A.S. degree.

- 1. English (Reading and Writing): Satisfy one or more of the following requirements
 - a. Satisfactory Completion of ENGL 100 (Reading and Composition) or ENGL 105 (Intensive Composition and Reading) with a grade of "C" or better; or
 - b. Score of 3, 4, or 5 on one of the following College Board Advanced Placement Tests (AP): English Language and Composition, English Literature and Composition
 - 1. Mathematics/Quantitative Reasoning: Satisfy one or more of the following requirements
 - a. Satisfactory Completion of MATH 120 (Intermediate Algebra) or MATH 190 (Path to Statistics) or BUS. 113 (Personal Finance) with a grade of "C" or better, or equivalent; or
 - b. Satisfactory completion of any course having MATH 120 (Intermediate Algebra) or MATH 190 (Path to Statistics) as a prerequisite with a grade of "C" or better; or
 - Score of 3, 4, or 5 on College Board Advanced Placement Tests (AP): Calculus AB, or Calculus BC, or Statistics: or
 - d. Score of 4 or higher on International Baccalaureate Exam(IB): Mathematics HL; or
 - e. Placement into transfer-level MATH course using SMCCCD math placement test if taken prior to fall 2019

E. General Education Requirements

General Education is the part of an educational program which introduces students to areas of study that develop breadth of outlook and contribute to balanced development. This general education is complementary to, but different in emphasis from, the specialized education received for a job, a profession, or from focusing on a particular field of study. The purpose of the program in General Education is to assist students in moving toward the following goals:

- Developing critical and constructive thinking for problem solving and value discrimination.
- Understanding their relationship to their biological, physical, and cultural environment.
- Understanding the creative activity of others and participating to some extent in creative activity.
- Using basic mechanical, mathematical, and communication skills to solve everyday problems, understand ideas of others, and express ideas effectively.
- Developing a code for personal and civic life as a responsible citizen in ademocracy.
- · Maintaining good mental and physical health and social adjustment.

- Associate in Arts Degree— 22 18 unitsminimum
- Associate in Science Degree—22 18 units minimum

Those students who wish to pursue an associate's degree (non ADT) from Cañada College and have been awarded a Bachelor's degree from an institution accredited by the Western Association of Schools & Colleges or equivalent accrediting body in the U.S. may be exempt from Cañada College's general education requirements., including the ethnic studies and physical education requirements (see F and G below). Students must submit an official transcript from the institution granting the Bachelor's degree to allow for verification of degree completion and to confirm that they have meet Title 5 requirements for competence in mathematics.

Educated people celebrate and value cultural diversity. The ethnic studies/cultural diversity graduation requirement demonstrates the commitment to include in the education of students the knowledge of the ever-changing diversity of our country. With the fulfillment of this requirement, students have the opportunity to see themselves and others in the mutually supportive relationship basic to the survival and prosperity of all of us.

To meet this requirement, students must complete one course with a minimum of 3-semester units (or 4-5 quarter units if taken at another institution using the quarter system, with approval) with a grade of "C" or better. If a 4- quarter unit course is used, students may substitute any additional Degree applicable units to fulfill the minimum 3-semester unit Ethnic Studies requirement.

Refer to Ethnic Studies in the Course Descriptions section of this Catalog or the AA/AS Degree Requirements worksheet for a list of specific courses.

F. Physical Education

Two activity courses in Physical Education are required. However this requirement may be waived or modified for students in one of the following categories:

- graduates of community colleges or other accredited colleges and universities
- · veterans with one or more years of service
- persons excused for medical reasons

Waivers other than for the reasons stated above should be sought following regular college procedures via the Academic Standards Committee.

G. Exceptions to General Education

Those students who wish to pursue an associate's degree from Cañada College and have been awarded a Bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university in the US may be exempt from Cañada College's general education requirements. including the ethnic studies requirement(see F above). Students must submit an official transcript from the institution granting the Bachelor's degree to allow for verification of degree completion and to confirm that they have meet Title 5 requirements for competence in mathematics.
